SMOKED HIM OUT ANDREW TRIPP

Sheriff Chauncey A. Harris' Bill for Nine Months Reaches a Total of \$6,522.61

When Sheriff Harris presented his bill to the Board of Supervisors at this October session, it was for the sum of \$5,675.38. The publication was secured in several newspapers that this was the amount of his "bill for conducting the Sheriff's office for the past year." It is at statement was untrue, and in fact would have been to deceive the public as to the true amount of his bill had it not been discovered and exposed. The bill, as presented to the Board, was for the first eight months of the year, when it should have been for nine months—from January to October. After the exposure was published, Sheriff Harris added to his bill his charges for the month of September, making the amount from January to October, **\$6,522.61**. This sum is over \$2,000.00 higher than former Sheriff's bills in their second year's incumbency of the office of Sheriff. Here are the figures: Sheriff Harris' bill, nine months, January to October, \$6,522.61. Sheriff Greer's bill, nine months, January to October, \$4,451.08. Sheriff Brewster's bill, nine months, January to October, \$4,275.82. Sheriff Smith's bill, nine months, January to October, \$4,031.32. Sheriff Judd's bill, nine months, January to October, \$3,403.62. Sheriff Kellam's bill, nine months, January to October, \$3,040.50. Sheriff Bloomberg's bill, nine months, January to October, \$3,040.67.

His answer will be mailed to all voters of Oakland county so far as he is able to get their name and addresses. The public are requested to suspend judgment until they have had an opportunity of hearing both sides.

Democrat Nominee for Sheriff of Oakland County Has a Great Following in His County.

Andrew J. Tripp, unanimously nominated by the Democrat electors at the primary election for Sheriff of Oakland County, was born in the Township of Commerce 45 years ago, and has resided there all his life. He is a farmer by occupation. He has held several public positions of trust and responsibility, in each of which he has performed his duties efficiently and creditably.

Elected by the votes of Democrats and Republicans of his township to the office of Treasurer two terms, and to the office of Supervisor for the last eight years successively which office, he now holds, his public services in these official positions have been so conspicuously fair and satisfactory that his fellow-townsmen have continued to re-elect him by large majorities, year after year, in a strongly Republican township. And in no year has his conduct of office been so inefficient and unsatisfactory that he has been compelled to make a hard fight, or any effort at all, to secure a re-nomination. These recognized tests of a man's fitness and adaptability for public office are not without significance.

Mr. Tripp has held other positions of trust and responsibility. He is and has been for the last three years President of the State Association of Supervisors, which meets at Lansing every year, and is Chairman of the Executive and Legislative Committees of that body. Of his qualifications for the office of sheriff of Oakland county there is no doubt; and in all public capacities he has been found on the right side of the cleavage between the faithful discharge of official duty and officious meddlingness. Wary when circumspection is required, fearless when courage is needed, the thief and burglar would have cause to apprehend detection and arrest equally with those committing lesser offenses. His administration of the sheriff's office, if he may be so called, would be characterized by alertness, sagacity, integrity and fidelity to the trust conferred by his charge.

And in closing this sketch attention may be called to the pledge of Candidate Tripp, made at the democratic convention on September 18, when called upon for a few remarks, he said in conclusion: "If elected sheriff it will be my untiring ambition to perform the duties of the office honestly, faithfully, fearlessly and to the best of my ability, so that no man, regardless of his party affiliation, will have reason to regret his having supported me at the polls."
