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Miss Barnes, of Rochester, Gave an Interesting Talk on the Hawaiian Islands With Stereopticon Views

About 50 ladies met at the home of Mrs. E. R. Smith, of Birmingham, 25 of whom were members of the Literary club, who answered to roll call with quotations from a living author.

After a brief business meeting the art and literature committee took charge of the program, introducing Miss Barnes, of Rochester, who gave an interesting talk on the Hawaiian Islands, illustrated with stereopticon views of the scenery, natives, their buildings, parks, etc.

These islands, the most important in the Polynesian group in the North Pacific, were discovered by Capt. Cook in 1778. He called them Sandwich Islands. On the largest island, Hawaii, from which the group receives its present name, is the noted volcano Mauna L. a and the hill Kilauea with a crater which is the largest, active one in the world. The ancient idolatrous religion has been abandoned since 1819 and the whole native population has embraced Christianity.

The Hawaiians are a good tempered, light hearted and pleasure loving race. They have many games and sports and the women spend much time in making flower gardens. Both sexes delight in adorning themselves with garlands of flowers. The native dwellings are frequently huts thatched with grass at the sides and top. Their food is chiefly pork, fish, the banana, yam, sweet potato, bread, fruit, coconut and the root of the kalo which affords the national dish called poi.

The business of the island is carried on principally by foreigners, and chiefly by Americans, British, Germans and Chinese, the last are the most numerous.
