Oakland county will pay out this year in state taxes just \$18,125 more than it receives in primary money. Sixty-three counties in this state receive back in primary money more than they actually pay in state taxes but Oakland is one of the larger counties of the state where the assessment for state taxes amounts to more than the primary money. This county received from the primary fund last May the sum of \$71,558.50 and in November \$11,854.30 making a total primary fund for the year of \$83,412.80. The state tax as equalized by the board of supervisors at the October session was \$99,527.30. According to the figures of Auditor General Fuller, 20 counties pay more in taxes than they receive in primary money. These counties pay into the state treasury a total of \$435,066.55 more than their apportionment of primary money.

These lessons together with sewing are given to the third, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh grades. After January 1st these lessons will be extended to "the high school." The high school time you are in Pontiac stop over there and see for yourself. It is less than two blocks from the main street.
