PERSONAL.

Edress Anna White, head of the North Valley shakers, is dead at Mount Lebanon, Mass., at the age of seventy years. She was a member of a wealthy New York family and was herself possessed of considerable wealth, which she devoted to the shaker cause.

Carl Hagbeck, the collector and trainer of wild animals, died at his home in the midst of a tropical garden at Stelling, a suburb of Hamburg.

Every wheel on the system stopped turning and every employe on the Central of Georgia road ceased to work for five minutes during the funeral at Macon of Maj. J. P. Hanson, president of the road.

President Gomez has accepted the resignation of Maj. Gen. Pino Garcia as commander-in-chief of the Cuban army.

GENERAL NEWS.

The Lorimer investigating committee submitted its report to the committee on privileges and elections. The report vindicates Mr. Lorimer, finding the bribery could not be traced to him and that bribery had not destroyed his constitutional majority.

The report is unanimous, being signed by the seven members of the committee. The Chinese throne has issued an edict refusing to create a constitutional cabinet in compliance with the memorial presented by the national assembly, and also declining to accept the resignations of the grand councilors.

Three jurors saved Attorney Charles E. Furbush from conviction on the charge that he bribed Judge McMichael, juror in the second district. Legislator Le O'Neil Browne, to vote for his client's acquittal. The first ball did not stand him for conviction for six months. At the finish the division was six to six and the jury was discharged.

President Taft, in an address before the American Society for the Judicial Settlement of International Disputes, in Washington, gave assurances that the country need not fear a world war scare. He said: "There is not the slightest reason for such a sensation because we are at peace with all the world who are not our enemies."

SEA RAID IN CUBA

DISASTER OCCURS IN THE ILOPANGO LAGOON, NEAR SAN SALVADOR.

WHEN "DUKE LOESENS HOMES FROM FOUNDATION SALVADORENSIS DIE."

Many Pan-Stricken Women and Children Drown Escape, But Rest Perish.

More than 170 persons perished Saturday when an island in the center of the Ilopango lagoon, off Salvador, suddenly was swallowed up by the sea.

The sinking of the island is said to have followed a series of events throughout the republic of Salvador. The shocks began early in the evening and progressed, without abatement, until the watches on shore heard the sound of guns from the people.

Shortly after that a huge bonfire was lighted on the island and a boat load of frightened women and children reached the mainland. They reported that the boats were coming as fast as they could be filled, as the island was slowly sinking under the feet of the inhabitants.

The boatmen of the mainland were asked to send aid, but in view of the continued shocks it was usually increasing violence of the sea in the lagoon, they were afraid to venture out.

While they debated, another more violent tremor shook the mainland and the island vanished. In the morning not a vestige of the island remained.

This is not the first time that small islands off the mainland have sunk after an earthquake. The Ilopango lagoon is a lake of Salvador, the center of the city of San Salvador. It is about five miles long and contains about 100,000 acres of water.

A later dispatch contains the destruction of the island, corroborating the reports of seismic shocks.

Merchants Fight Chicago Post.

The information from Chicago that the American League of Associations, organized for the purpose of making the business of the country, has started a vigorous campaign against the proposed establishment of a national clearing house.

It is reported that the clearing house bill now before congress is looked upon as a serious threat to the interests of the large mail order houses and has caused injury to the rural communities.

On the other hand, some of the manufacturers who sell through mail order agencies are strongly in favor of it because they do a large mail order business themselves.

Beet Growers Organize.

The first steps towards an organized effort to secure a fair price for sugar beets from the Michigan sugar factories were taken in May last when the Michigan Beet Growers' association was formed by growers from Shiawassee, Washtenaw, Livingston, Ingham, and Isabella and Iay counties.

The territory included in these counties covers an area of 1,000,000 acres, and in eastern Michigan, including Owasco, but not Lansing. The growers will demand \$2.00 per ton for beets, 12 per cent sugar and 40 cents for each additional one per cent of sugar.
