would be cold indeed; they have been specially indispensable to the comfort and welfare of the wounded in Sheridan Field Hospital. By their untiring exertions, the sufferings of the wounded at this hospital have been greatly relieved, and the men made to rejoice in their ministrations of mercy."

I was not 20 when the war broke out. I have not had a day of health since. Exposure to heavy rains, riding in springless wagons, over the country, not always roads, and a very severe fall, which has left my back terribly sensitive, these and other hardships have wrecked my life. Conditions in our country are widely different from what they were in Sheridan, and in the war of '61 to '65. From the many graves in national cemeteries a voice would come, such a thing were possible, and from our rulers to "make this a government indeed of the people, for the people and by the people."

How well I remember the intense feeling in the voice of our beloved and martyred Lincoln, as he said these words. We were about three feet from him on the platform, when he spoke in the National cemetery of Gettysburg.
