DONALD F. NOBLE, DET. IND. EXPO. BLUE RIBBON BIG CIVIC EVENT

Announces Himself Republican Candidate For Prosecuting Attorney For Oakland County

Donald F. Noble was born on a farm near Uxbridge, Ont., in 1870, and obtained his education in the public and high schools of that town, in Toronto Normal school and Toronto University. He taught school for three years, and in 1883 came to Pontiac in this county, and in the fall of that year entered the law department of the University of Michigan from which he graduated with the degree of L. L. B., in 1886, and was at once admitted to practice law in supreme courts of both Michigan and Ohio, as well as in the circuit court of the United States and immediately commenced the practice of his profession.

In 1897 he located in Milford in this county where he has ever since continued to reside, and for the past 13 years has been actively and successfully engaged in the practice of law in Oakland county.

Mr. Noble has always been a staunch republican in politics and ever since locating in Milford has been a vigorous worker and an active factor in the republican party of Oakland county; he is a gentleman of good habits, strong personality and determination, and eminently qualified in integrity, education, legal experience and natural ability to fill the office of prosecuting attorney for Oakland county. He is an ardent believer in primary elections for the nomination of county officials and pledges himself that if nominated and elected prosecuting attorney he will enforce the law as he finds it without fear or favor to any.

What Do You Know About This? Birmingham to Have a Special Day at the Detroit Industrial Exposition

Birmingham will have a special day at the Detroit Industrial Exposition. It will be Thursday, June 23. The exposition which will be held June 20 to July 6, 1910, will be the greatest civic event in Detroit's history and will rank with Cleveland's exposition of last year as one of the two greatest home production expositions ever held in the United States. Two hundred exhibits will be displayed in the great temporary exhibition hall built for the occasion and in the Wayne Pavilion, Detroit's largest auditorium.

The Detroit Board of Commerce is the sponsor for the exposition, and in carrying out its preliminary plans, this organization has had the co-operation of all the interests of the city. No effort has been spared to make the exposition an entertainment of far greater magnitude and interest than has ever been held in Michigan. Machinery will be operated, making the necessities and luxuries of life, and an accompaniment to the humming of thousands of wheels, will be the music of two large concert bands that will give afternoon and evening programs.

The illumination promises to be the most brilliant of its kind. There will be a decorated approach more than a half mile long on Jefferson avenue, leading up to the magnificent entrance gates. Inside the buildings will be many thousands of incandescent lamps, setting off the elaborate decorative scheme.

Realizing the great interest that has been manifested throughout Michigan, all of the railroads of the Michigan Passenger Association have granted a special rate of one and one-half fare for the round trip, with a minimum fare of \$1. Tickets are to be sold June 22, limited for return to reach the original starting point not later than midnight of June 25, and to be sold on June 29, limited for return to reach original starting point not later than midnight of July 1.

Trotting and Pacing Meeting to be held on the State Fair Track, August 1 to 5, 1910.

Never has the general outlook for trotting and pacing been as bright as it is this year. More good horses are being raised and there is more enthusiasm among the owners and drivers, so that when the bell rings those who enjoy the sport of the sulky will have a chance to see some exceptional contests.

The season of high class racing lasts three months and while more than a dozen tracks will conduct this kind of sport during that time there will be no meeting so freely talked about as Detroit's famous Blue Ribbon, the leader for more than a quarter of a century. This year the Detroit meeting will be held during the first week in August from the first to the fifth, this change rendering it possible for the driving club to stage a series of futurity (colt) races that are valued at almost \$9,000.

There has been much activity at the state fair grounds where the Detroit meetings are held. Trainers have been arriving since early in April and their horses are well advanced. Gus Macky, who won the M. & M. with Spanish Queen, is on hand with another for this year's stake, and a stable of very fast trotters and pacers. W. L. Snow has among his 25 head the mare Darkey Hal, and Dan McEwen is there with the Bel. Each of these pacers has a record of 2:02, and they are the fastest by record that will race this year. They never have met in a race but will be factors in the free-for-all race at the Blue Ribbon meeting, which will be but one of the many good things during the five days.

Under the Auspices of the Detroit Board of Commerce, will be From June 20 to July 6

President Taft will start the wheels of the Detroit Industrial Exposition in motion on the evening of June 20. This exhibition of home products is to be given under the auspices of the Detroit Board of Commerce and will cover the period from June 20 to July 6. The committee in charge consists of 275 leading manufacturers, representing a capital of \$150,000,000, and the plans have been made on a liberal scale. One of the largest temporary exhibition halls in the country has been erected, and will be used in conjunction with Detroit's most spacious auditorium, the Wayne Pavilion. It is estimated that the total value of the exhibits will exceed \$1,000,000, and it is Detroit's acclaim that its exposition will be one of the largest of its kind ever conducted.

The exposition site is on the beautiful Detroit river, and one of the features will be a riverside garden. The products of Detroit's many factories will be attractively displayed, and the processes of manufacture will be shown, with electricity, gas and water power propelling the great variety of machinery.

The exposition will include an automobile show, a food fair, a machinery display, a furniture exhibit, an electrical show, and interesting exhibits of other lines of production.

There will be a decorated approach a half mile long, leading to the buildings, 25,000 incandescents being included in the general illuminating scheme.

Aside from the exhibits of manufacturers, there will be displays by civic institutions, and among the entertainment features will be afternoon and evening programs daily by large concert bands.

The fact that the exposition will be the greatest event in Detroit's history has led the committee to announce that it hopes to establish a new American record for door attendance.
