GRAZING ON NATIONAL FORESTS

THE amount of stock which will be authorized to graze on the national forests during the season of 1919, determined by the secretary of agriculture, shows an increase in the total number which will be allowed, as compared with the number last year of approximately 200,000 cattle and horses and 500,000 sheep and goats.

The most important increases are in the states of Nevada, Colorado, Montana, Utah and Washington, and except in Nevada, where over a million acres have been added to the national forest area of the state, throughout the country the result of improved range conditions due to regulated grazing.

It can be stated that the secretary of agriculture is very solicitous to secure the fullest possible utilization of the range resources of the national forests, in order that the forests may contribute just as far as possible to the government control of the forest range, a marked improvement in the weight and quality of the stock produced.

"I have just received a communication from Dr. Cooper Curtice, veterinarian in charge of the bureau of animal industry of this department, setting forth certain opinions respecting the burning of forests and ranges to destroy ticks and ticks which transmit disease, in which the department fully concurs.

Under present conditions the mountain livestock crops and herds are making small crops, and are raising a very poor quality of cattle and hogs. By attending to better cultivation of the range and feeding the stock, they can raise a very high quality of stock and acquire a better money crop than they have heretofore held.

"From my observation and conversations with the farmers of the Ozark forest, on my recent trip, I am led to believe that they will take up tick eradication as soon as they can raise the necessary money. Question on Nomination of Judges. How three circuit judges shall be nominated this fall to stand for the election of 1920 is a question that is perplexing the state law department. Judge Collingwood of Lansing, Finnigan of Marquette and the state board of auditors are to fill vacancies and the law provides that an election shall be held this fall in those cities.

Seeks to Issue Bonds. The Saginaw Power company has filed an application with the state railroad commission for authority to issue bonds, which followed in general terms of similar petitions of the other power companies listed in the annual report of the commission. A \$1,000,000 issue of bonds for take up outstanding in new bonds for \$200,000 of the same was to be taken from the property of the company.

Went Pay Fletcher's Bill. Commissioner of labor Richard Fletcher has asked attorney General Kuhn for an interpretation of the law relative to the payment of charges for sending annual reports from the office of the state labor commissioner. This year the express charges on the books amounted to \$98 and when Fletcher presented a bill to Auditor General Fuller to secure the cash Mr. Fuller refused to draw a warrant, claiming that the money should be taken from the appropriation granted the state labor commission.

Fire Insurance Cost Lower. Despite an increased loss ratio in fire insurance business in Michigan during 1909 there has been a decrease in the cost of insurance, according to a report of insurance agent Charles Barry. "The loss ratio for the year shows an increase over the previous year of \$1.50 per cent.," he stated. "The average rate of premium per \$100 of insurance written was \$1.15, the lowest in thirty years. As compared with 1908 this average shows a decrease of seven cents per \$100 of insurance written."

Supreme Court Admits New Lawyers. One hundred and seventy-five graduates of the law department of the University of Michigan were presented to the supreme court to be admitted to the bar. Justice McAlvay in a brief address to the graduates said he believed in the democracy of education as the hope of the nation.
