## THE STATE FAIR MIDWAY THIS YEAR IS IN CHARGE OF T. E. NEWTON, AMUSEMENT MAN.

One reason why the amusement features of the State Fair, Sept. 19-24th, bid fair to excel anything ever before attempted, is because this part of the Fair arrangement has been placed in the hands of a man of long experience in the amusement world, Thomas E. Newton, Vice-President of the Fair Association.

Mr. Newton, when he took hold of the work was determined to spare neither time nor expense in securing the best there was to be had in the amusement line. He has made several trips East and South for the purpose of contracting for attractions, and while the amusements have not been all signed up as yet, still from the start it is thought this department will more than live up to expectations.

It has been Mr. Newton's policy to secure only those attractions of known worth, as he believes that the public today is ready and willing to pay its money to see something worth while. The Wright brothers' aeroplanes were secured for the Michigan Fair before any other Fair in the country had signed them. John's glassblowers, an act which will show only at Toronto and Michigan, is regarded as one of the strongest drawing cards to be seen; also California Frank's Wild West Show, and others already signed. The management feels that the Midway this year will set a new standard for this department of great Fairs.
