PERSONAL.

Prince Nicholas of Montenegro celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of his accession by assuming the status and title of king and restoring to his country its ancient name of Zeta.

Olaf Hanson of Seattle was elected president of the world's congress of the dead at Colorado Springs.

GENERAL NEWS.

Alfred Villa reached Tucson, Ariz., after driving forty miles with the body of his brother, who had been killed by lightning.

Robert Treat Paine, president of the American Peace Alliance, died at his home in Waltham, Mass.

An excursion train from Bordeaux, with 1,200 passengers and running at a speed of 40 miles an hour, crashed on a freight train at Dijon, France.

Rioting was resumed in Columbus, O., and one man was fatally shot and five others injured.

Four persons were killed and three injured when a south-bound passenger struck an automobile crossing near Rochester, Ind.

Nearly 400 persons have perished and 500 are missing as a result of the flood that threatened to submerge 40 Tokyo. The damage to property is enormous.

It will take many days to place the Belgian expedition in a fit condition for reopening, although a large majority of the soldiers are still intact.

SECRET MARRIAGES

LIST IN BOX HIDDEN IN SECRETARY OF STATE'S VAULT.

SEE IS ONLY ONE DOLLAR

There is a Heavy Penalty Attached for Any Person Making Public the Names of Contracting Parties.

Lansing—Few people in the state are perhaps aware that in a secret box in the vault in the state office there reposes a list of secret marriages performed by judges of probate.

Up to 1907 the judge of probate did not have authority to marry except in these secret cases, but since that time the judge of probate is authorized to officiate in the ordinary marriage.

Women's Names Are Filed.—The Socialists are going to have a complete list of the names of all women who have been married in Michigan.

Charles Erb, for congressman, charged with the duty of proctoring the names of all women who have been married in Michigan.

Not Included in Primary Law.—No provision is contained in the primary election law providing for the nomination of commissioners of schools in the counties where these officials are elected in the spring.

Michigan Corporations.—The following companies have filed articles of incorporation with the secretary of state.

Express Rates Hearing.—The hearing on express rates fixed by the state railroad commission has been postponed.

Will Sell Dead Timber.—Russell announced that he is making arrangements to sell all the dead and damaged timber on state lands.

Percentage of Insane Smaller.—Reports filed by the superintendents of the large insane asylums of the state, at Pontiac, Kalamazoo, Traverse City and Newberry, reveal that notwithstanding the increase in the population of the state during the past year fewer patients have been admitted to these asylums.

Can Legally Fix Rates.—Senator Gen. E. B. Kuhn, in a written opinion, furnished the state railroad commission holds that the commission has authority to classify passenger and freight rates.
