## SEE FIREWORKS IN SANITARIUM FRANK L. DOTY SURE AND STEADY

At the State Fair--Many Absolutely New Figures to Be Offered Visitors to the Big Show.

Mrs. Franklin Alford, of Royal Oak, Died Tuesday, August 16, Aged 68 Years.

Believing in the old saying, "Young Men for War, Old Men for Council," Doty Declares Himself.

Patrick H. Kelley Getting the Solid Support of Michigan Republicans as Candidate for Governor.

In preparing the fireworks program for the coming State Fair, September 19 to 24, the Gregory Fireworks Company, of Chicago, will present to the public many new features which have never before been attempted in the field of pyrotechny. Fireworks experts will work for months at a time in developing a new idea, and their efforts, at least so far as the Michigan Fair program is concerned, will meet with a most decided success.

Mrs. Franklin Alford died at Noble Sanitarium, Detroit, on Tuesday, August 16. The funeral was held from her home on Center Street, Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. O. W. Willett, pastor of the M. E. Church, had charge of the service, and she was laid to rest in Royal Oak Cemetery.

Mr. Frank L. Doty, who is a candidate for the nomination of Prosecuting Attorney on the republican ticket, has made a very strong impression upon the young men in his party. One of the leading business men of Pontiac, in discussing Mr. Doty's candidacy, said recently: "It is an age of young men. The most efficient public prosecution of graft on a large scale which have swept the country recently have practically all been conducted by young men. Mr. Heney who prosecuted the western land frauds, and who was selected to clean up San Francisco, with the result that he was shot in the courtroom, so well did he do his work, and Mr. Colby, who has so relentlessly kept after the grafters in New Jersey are notable examples."

While the past week has brought political clouds which have overcast the sky of one of its opponents, Patrick H. Kelley has been sailing along on a sure, steady, and sunny course, giving no attention to the quarrel which has arisen between Governor Warner and Chase S. Osborn, one of his appointees. Not once, in any of his speeches has Mr. Kelley referred to the stirring incident of the past week, and his sane course has helped his course in every portion of the State.

One of the new numbers, never before presented to the public, will be "Halley's Comet." This feature is accomplished by discharging oblong shells high in the heavens, which sends forth an immense parachute bearing a beautiful magnesium light, representing the head of the comet. Aluminum gerbs throwing out long trailers of luminous fires representing the tail of the comet. This is a most spectacular number and will be shown at the Michigan Fair for the first time in the country.

At Big Rapids last week Mr. Kelley's meeting was open to allow Chase S. Osborn to speak in reply, and when Mr. Kelley interrupted the Senator to ask him whether it was not true that he had furnished \$500 for Governor Warner's primary campaign fund two years ago, Mr. Osborn declared that he was not, and further stated that he had supported Dr. Bradley in the primaries. The matter was dropped there by Mr. Kelley, but Governor Warner took up Mr. Osborn's denial and came back in the State papers with the statement that Mr. Osborn had contributed \$500, and that the record in his office at Lansing showed it. Correspondents for various metropolitan papers examined the records, found the statement true, and flashed the news through the State.

"My Country! Thy of Thee," is the title of another elaborate figure to be presented in fireworks. It represents the facade of the White House at Washington with Old Glory floating from the dome.

"Mrs. Alford was for many years a member of the M. E. Church. Although an invalid for several years, she bore up bravely. She was removed to a Detroit hospital several weeks ago, where it was thought she might be comforted, but it was found she had not sufficient vitality for her to rally.

"The next move came from Mr. Osborn, who had evidently thought better of his hasty denial at Big Rapids, and who admitted that he had contributed as Mr. Warner charged. Mr. Osborn added that he had been 'assailed' and compelled to pay, which he did, he stated, 'with a man, despite the fact that he says he was, supporting Dr. Bradley.' He compared his position to that of George Washington, who held a commission under King George of England, but enlisted as Commander-in-Chief of the army of the colonies. To this Governor Warner came back with a broadside which cleared the decks, publishing a letter in which the Senator showed the most friendly feeling and in which he referred to a meeting at which he had addressed in Calumet, where he advocated Governor Warner's election and, to use Mr. Osborn's own words, 'talked almost entirely on State issues.'"

The Governor openly charged Mr. Osborn with double dealing between himself and Dr. Bradley, and answered the Senator's reference to George Washington by saying, "History does not record that George Washington ever fought on one side and gave financial assistance to the other, nor does history record that it took two years to learn where George Washington stood. The Governor came forward with his letter only after two prominent State papers had demanded that he furnish proofs that Mr. Osborn's campaign against 'Warner' was not being conducted in good faith, and was based only on selfish political grounds. The Lansing Republican, in demanding that the Governor come forward with his proofs, said: 'If Governor Warner's charges are true they should defeat Chase Osborn for the nomination of Governor of this State. Mr. Osborn could hardly do otherwise than retire from the race. Come on with the proofs, Governor Warner. If Chase S. Osborn is your friendly letter during your primary campaign, the people want to know that. If he contributed \$500 you in office for a third term, people want to know that. Mr. Osborn has said that he did not support you for the nomination. On the freedom of that ground he has hurled what he declares are sincere charges against you and your administration. If he support you, the people of the State will know that he is not sincere, and the people have a right to know whether the men who are asking for high office are true or false. Come on with the proofs, Governor Warner, or forever hold your peace.'"

"The heroic figure of a plowman is seen in the right foreground and that of a National Guardsman on the left. Brilliantly-colored fires outline the picture, and there is a mammoth battery discharging fires from the right and left, meeting in a canopy over the entire scene. This is also an exceedingly difficult presentation, covering 25,000 square feet of space in the heavens.

"Mrs. Alford leaves many friends to mourn her loss, and the members of her family have the sympathy of the entire community.

"The force of this sentiment will appeal to all, and the voters will make no mistake in choosing Mr. Doty, a young man of action and practical experience.--Pontiac Press Gazette.

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"The Shover of Pearls," "The Star and Garter," "Michigan Peacock," and other special pieces will make up the diversified and highly interesting nightly programs of fireworks. The "Michigan Peacock" in particular is described as more than an ordinary number. When the huge bird first appears, its tail is shown folded up by a mechanical device the feathers appear out like a fan with a shower of sparks from the ends of the feathers. There will be an elaborate plan of illumination used each night with constantly changing colors, which will light up the entire exhibition field in a grand and wonderful manner, forming a spectacular background for the set pieces which follow in rapid succession.
