AT HOME AND ABROAD

Griffis aggregating \$355,000 were made by the college and university at a New York meeting of the Rockefeller general education board.

Something of a sensation in connection with the Rosebud land lottery developed when it was disclosed that 41 sections of the Rosebud tract in Blaine and Dakota have been bought by the state for Indian school lands.

The federal government filed suit at Trenton, N. J., against the United States Steel corporation to compel its dissolution to an illegal combine.

The United States Supreme court, in an opinion by Justice Van Devanter, gave broad powers to the interstate commerce commission in a sweeping interpretation of the federal anti-trust law.

President Taft officially has designated Thursday, November 30, as Thanksgiving day, and in doing so has recognized the great significance of Chicago as a temporary capital of the United States.

SECS INVESTIGATION

WILL USE AN AUTOMOBILE

Investigators of Transportation Facilities Start Tour in Thumb Section

R. R. Darwin of the Michigan Railroad Commission and J. J. Day expect to cover Town North of Port Huron.

Lansing—R. R. Darwin, chief inspector of the Michigan railroad commission, left for Port Huron to join Robert H. Day, manager of the transportation bureau in Detroit...
