MUSHROOMS AND TOADSTOOLS

The abundant fall of rains having brought out a large crop of fungi in the woods fields and lawns, the question has often come to the fore: "How can I tell mushrooms from toadstools?" In the first place, the mushrooms and toadstools are practically synonymous, the only difference being in their habit of growing. The mushroom grows from the soil, while the toadstool grows from decaying organic matter. In the first place, there is no one name which can be used to distinguish the two. The following rules are dangerous, because they do not distinguish the edible from the poisonous ones, viz: Cooking mushrooms with a silver spoon; putting salt upon the under side of the gill to notice whether they change color; the presence of a pink streak at the base of the stem of the cap will peel off easily; the fact that the taste is mild, etc. As mushrooms, whether edible or poisonous, will turn a silver spoon black if the mushroom is a little old, while most mushrooms whether poisonous or otherwise, if rubbed with silver, will turn a silver spoon black.

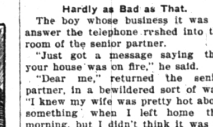
