AT HOME AND ABROAD

Staplethings That Are Making History

Information Gathered from All Quarters of the Week and Given in a Few Lines

Washington

At the annual meeting of the National Red Cross in Washington reports of the work of relieving the victims of disasters in many lands were presented by the president, W. H. Taft and the other officers were elected.

A joint resolution providing for the termination of the treaty of 1823 with Russia was introduced in the National House of Representatives at Washington by Representative Sulzer of New York, chairman of the committee on foreign affairs.

Declaring that unless the friar lands in the Philippines are speedily disposed of they will become a heavy financial drain on the Philippine government, the chairman of the committee on insular affairs, in Washington, in his annual report, recommends that these lands be sold.

In his annual report, which has just been submitted to President Taft, Secretary of the Navy Meyer recommends the establishment of a special safeguard of international peace in preparation for war, and advises that the American navy be not increased but that the present strength of about forty battleships.

The deficiency of the federal government continues to grow. Up to date the disbursements of the current fiscal year have exceeded the receipts \$20,610,000, while the amount of the deficit was \$20,181,000.

The eastern trunk lines have been visited by the Interstate Commerce commission until February 1 to fix their joint passenger fares within the trunk line territory, which extends from the Atlantic seaboard to Chicago.

The United States is keeping in readiness at Manila an expeditionary force of from 800 to 2,500 soldiers for immediate dispatch to China for the purpose of protecting American interests so help upon railway construction between Peking and the sea. The order for starting the troops awaits only the word from American Minister Calhoun at Peking.

Domestic

The Kansas Flour Milling company, with a capital stock of \$2,000,000, has been granted a charter by the state of Kansas. The new company is a merger of five large milling concerns.

The National Irrigation congress opened in Chicago and because the mediation of swamp lands has a prominent place on the program, the number of delegates from the south and east was unusually large.

John D. Rockefeller resigned as president and director of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey. John A. Archbold was elected as Mr. Rockefeller's successor.

While sailing at 40 miles an hour off Cape Cod, Mrs. James G. Thompson, who a short time before had been married, a touring car driven by John Gormley, overturned in Walnut avenue, Roxbury, Mass. Two women were killed, one woman and two men were seriously injured.

Nearly 100,000,000 worth of domestic merchandise from the United States was transported across the border of Panama in the fiscal year of 1911, via the two railway lines.

The United National bank of Columbus, Ohio, passed a resolution of suspension of its business on the part of its directors. The capital stock of the bank was \$750,000. Its surplus \$100,000 and it estimated that its deposits amounted to \$2,000,000.

Without consulting Speaker Champ Clark, his friends passed a resolution at St. Louis and state headquarters in Louisiana, Mo., to further the movement to obtain for the Missouri the Democratic nomination for the presidency in 1917.

Strong objection has been made to the settlement of lands, which has been filed in the Pine Ridge (S. D.) reservation. Baker, the agent at Pierre, asserts that the Indians claim have prior rights.

Rudolph Blankenburg was inaugurated mayor of Philadelphia. For the first time in years the city is governed by a man who was not elected by the Republican organization.

Harry Sculling, Socialist, who tied Mayor Turnbull of Canton, O., in the recent municipal election and who lost the mayoralty when the tie was broken by the Republican party, has filed 100,000 bushels of corn, his filed a contest.

United States District Attorney Simpson of McPetersburg, Va., has notified Harrison of the department of justice filed anti-trust proceedings at Cincinnati alleging conspiracy in restraint of trade and the violation of the Sherman act by the Standard Oil Company of Dayton, O., its registers and managers.

The Missouri supreme court, in an opinion by Judge Woodson, held that the Missouri 16-hour railway trainmen's law was nullified by the federal 16-hour law.

Judge Adger J. Pettit, with the tears streaming down his cheeks, sentenced Thomas Scheltz, nineteen-year-old Frankfort, Ky., boy, to ten years' hard labor, aged twenty-one and twenty-four years respectively, and Philip Somersing, thirty-five years old, charged with the murder of Fred W. Guelzow, Jr., the young truck gardener, in Chicago, October 20.

Mrs. Gertrude Gibson Patterson ate her Thanksgiving dinner outside the Denver prison walls. She was detained by the United States to enjoin the trial of the murderer of her husband, Charles A. Patterson, whom she shot to death while the couple were walking together in a suburb of that city on September 25.

Capt. Edward Swaney and four of his crew were rescued from the steamer Diamond, which was blown up in the Ohio river near Pittsburgh. Two of the men rescued are terribly injured and may die. The boilers lit, but the cause of the explosion is not known.

James B. McNamara pleaded guilty to a charge of murder preferred against him in connection with the dynamiting of the tunnel at Los Angeles, Cal. At the same time his brother, John J. McNamara, entered a plea of guilty to a charge of bowing to the king in the case.

Another amazing disclosure in the McNamara dynamite plot came when Robert F. Bain, the first juror sworn at the trial of James B. McNamara, confessed that his wife accepted a bribe of about \$500 from the defense as part payment; if the sum which was to be paid to her stood out of the acquittal of James B. McNamara.

Supreme Court Justice Stapleton in his dissenting opinion in the case of Hain, admitted that he had been an eighty-year-old man when he was sentenced in Sing Sing for the murder of William E. Miller, who was awarded an absolute decree of divorce from his wife, Claudia L. Hains.

Government control of corporations to protect public interest, to insure stability of business; publicity of corporation affairs and less presidential politics were urged by Robert H. Garry, chairman of the board of directors of the United States Steel corporation, as remedies for trust evils and business unrest, before the senate committee on interstate commerce in Washington.

Foreign

The Persian national council has telegraphed an appeal for aid to the American congress and to the sister parliaments of the world.

Sports

David L. Bruce Broaw of New York city, driving a Fiat car, won his second successive prize race over the Savannah (Ga.) automobile course and broke the world's record for so lengthy a contest. He captured the 4000 ft. course in 5 hours 31 minutes and 10 seconds, an average rate of speed of 74.45 miles an hour.

The battle scheduled between Ad Wolgast and Freddie Welsh, the British champion, is off and Wolgast lies in Clara Barron hospital at Los Angeles, Cal., recovering from an operation for the removal of his verminous appendix.

Packer McFarland, the idol of the Chicago stockyard, was awarded the decision over Harlem Tommy Murphy at the end of a round of fighting before 6,000 critical spectators at San Francisco.

Personal

Senator Henry Cabot Lodge of Massachusetts addressed 3,000 people at Raleigh, N. C., and vigorously attacked the initiative, referendum and recall.

Dr. Frederick A. Cook has entered suit against the New York Times. Charged with libel, he claims that the paper by publishing false and defamatory statements for which he asks \$100,000 damages.

Only Matter touched On in President's Message to Congress

Additional Legislation to Strengthen Present Statutes Is Recommended—Defends Standard Oil and Tobacco Decisions

Washington—President Taft's annual message, which was read in both houses of congress Tuesday, extensively touched on the anti-trust statute. The message is the first since the inauguration of the president.

To the Senate and House of Representatives: This message is the first of several which I shall send to congress during the interval between the opening of its regular session and its adjournment for the Christmas holidays. The amount of information to be communicated to the public by the government, the number of important subjects calling for the attention of congress, and the opportunity to congress of exhaustive reports by special commissioners, make it impossible to include in one message of a reasonable length a discussion of the topics that ought to be brought to the attention of the national legislature at its first regular session.

The Anti-Trust Law—The Supreme Court Decisions. In May last the Supreme court handed down its decision in the case of equity brought by the United States to enjoin the Standard Oil Company of Indiana, U. S. v. E. C. Knight, et al., and the American Tobacco Company, U. S. v. American Tobacco Company, et al. These decisions are epoch-making and serve to advise the business world authoritatively of the scope and extent of the anti-trust law of 1890. The decisions do not deny the need and wisdom of the previous decisions of the court in construing and applying this important statute.

It is not intended that the line of the law under federal control and supervision of the industrial combination should be extended to include the accumulation of large capital in business enterprises in which the individual can secure reduced cost of production, and which are not in competition with any other business of the same kind.

It is not the purpose of the anti-trust statute to interfere with the property and capital of the offering trusts. Methods of punishment for the violation of the statute are provided, by fine of the corporation, or by imprisonment of the individual, or by both, as provided, but the proceeding in equity of specific relief by injunction and prevention of the future use of the plant and machinery of the trust is not intended.

It has been assumed that the present anti-trust statute is sufficient to deal with these companies by former stockholders who have been liquidated. It is the purpose of the same old single control of all the companies into which the trust has been broken, and is based upon the assumed independence and independence of the companies. The companies are enjoined to operate as independent business concerns, and to have different managers, directors, purchasing and sales agents. If all or any of these companies should combine to form a new trust, the anti-trust law would be violated.
