E. Mather, F. Ph., Eng., M. D. Gives Some Interesting Facts Concerning Cancerous Troubles

Dr. E. Mather, once a Birminghamer is now consulting physician to the Cancer Hospital, Chicago, and treasurer of the American Cancer Research society, New York, Detroit. The doctor is a very busy man these days with his practice in his Detroit office at 168 West High street, where he has a large practice. Every other week he is in Chicago attending to his duties there. The remarks made before the Chicago clinic at the Cancer Hospital, Feb. 7, we give below, and these remarks are followed by a short lecture before the Cancer Research laboratory of the Chicago hospital.

"We have no need to make an excuse as regards this or that case you will observe by these cases, that we have all classes to deal with, and all kinds of remedies or treatments for each individual case. What will cure or remove one cancer, may not do for another case, still you note case after case treated successfully.

Take the case of cancer of the tongue Mrs. Mac two years ago never expected to recover, but is now well. How what Thuga and Hydrastis did for her. Mrs. D. case of cancer of the head, note what the following treatment did for her, with very quick relief, after having been practically turned down, it having been burnt out with X ray treatments. Mrs. B. cancer of the left breast, two years used injections of Lobelia with pads composed of a fluid kresolium and witch hazel three times a day, then use same the Battle Creek Arc light, and give Silica and Thuga according to her case. It is not the extreme measure, but it is knowing how to use your remedy according to the case, some will answer where others will fail.

Let me permit me to draw your attention to a case of cancer, carcinoma of the breast, two years growth when removed, it weighed three and one half pounds, it was caused by a bruise from a fall. Dr. W. A. Guild, of Iowa, referred to the wonderful improvements of today and those of 50 years ago.

It is very sad to become aware of the fact that so many lives are yearly sacrificed to a perfunctory examination, instead of the most careful diagnosis, before attempting the same for that it is merely "change of life," for these symptoms are often very misleading and at the same time often prove fatal. As a matter of fact, in the instance it is all probable that an excessive discharge, occurring in any period of a woman's life, is accompanied by disease of one form or another, and of course, if such discharge is mucopurulent or bloody, and of an offensive odor, a serious view must necessarily be adopted, and active measures taken without delay.

It is impossible to lay too great stress upon the above observations, and I trust my zeal will not be misunderstood. The natural history of certain thellomias differs very much from that of scirrhus; the former invariably attacks a tissue which has been weakened by pre-existing disease, and its structure resembles the tissues which it originates; in the latter, scirrhus shows itself in the tissues in most instances where there has been an entire absence of indications which would lead one to prognosticate its advent.

Moreover, there is sufficient ground for supposing that scirrhus is the result of the transmission of one or more cells foreign to the part which is attacked. Epitheliomas of the uterus,

on the other hand, would seem the result, in the first instance, of an irritated condition of the matrix of the epithelium, the consequence being that abnormal cells are generated and their proliferation increased prostrata. Symptoms very similar are manifested in myocoele, which we know are invariably accompanied by metrorrhagia to a greater or less extent. When this disease is treated by means of thyroid gland, the epithelium is restored to health again, and consequently the hemorrhage ceases. It is astonishing the increase of that most horrible of all human maladies, cancer, not only in the United States, is this disease on the increase, but also abroad. Let us note the increase of cancer in other countries. Take England for instance, also Scotland, Sweden, Germany and other European countries, also in Australia; the numbers given out by the life insurance companies are immense. It is regarded by me as the most common form of cancer than from tuberculosis. I have seen from the very worst cases of cancer in Europe, still you will observe that cancer in England has increased much more rapidly among men than among women. It is strange to say that cancer is found much more on the increase in certain parts of the country if the people would become educated to the fact that by early treatment of this disease many lives could be saved and recovery be delayed. This assertion is proven by the cases which have been brought before you at this clinic here today.
