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### COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Birmingham, Mich., Feb. 20, 1911.

Adjourning regular monthly meeting of the Birmingham Village Council, President George E. Daines in the chair.

Trustees present—Mills, Smith, Johnston, Nichols, Crawford.

Trustees absent—Schlack. Crawford moved, Nichols seconded the following bill be allowed as read.

GENERAL FUND. W. J. Bell, \$200.00. George L. Kemp, \$50.00.

WATERWORKS FUND. E. C. McQuater, \$102.50. Voted by roll call.

Yeas—Mills, Smith, Johnston, Nichols, Crawford.

Nays—None. Mills moved, Crawford seconded, the village treasurer's returns of unpaid taxes amounting to \$49.16 be accepted.

Voted by roll call. Yeas—Crawford, Mills, Smith, Johnston, Nichols.

Nays—None. Nichols moved, Smith seconded, Trustees Johnston and Crawford be appointed to act with the clerk as members of the board of registration.

Motion carried. Nichols moved, Mills seconded, that the president appoint three inspectors of election. Motion carried and the president appointed Nichols, Johnston and Crawford as inspectors of election.

Johnston moved, Mills seconded, that the following resolution submitted by Trustee Smith be adopted as read.

Voted by roll call. Yeas—Smith, Johnston, Nichols, Crawford, Mills.

Nays—None. Motion carried. WHEREAS, the Detroit United Railway, successor of the Oakland Railway Company, owns, maintains and operates a line of electric railway extending through the village of Birmingham, and

WHEREAS, the double tracks of said railway are located on the easterly side of Woodward Avenue in said village between Willets street and the River Rouge; and

WHEREAS, it is deemed desirable and for the best interests of said village that said tracks be removed within the limits above mentioned, as follows: The center line between the tracks shall be a straight line beginning at a point thirty-four and seven tenths (34 7/10) feet west of the north line of lot ninety-eight (98), Willets or Oak Grove subdivision, running thence southerly on a straight line making an angle of no degrees, nine and one half (9 1/2) minutes, west of the west property line of Willets or Oak Grove subdivision for a distance of approximately five hundred seventy-nine (79) feet, thence by a one (1) degree, thirty (30) minutes curve to the right for two (2) degrees, seven (7) minutes to connect with the center line between the tracks as now located and shall be laid thereon in accordance with the map or plat hereto attached, and being drawing numbered 576-Q; and

WHEREAS, the said railway company has signified its willingness to remove said tracks to a point as herein described, as follows: The center line between the tracks shall be a straight line beginning at a point thirty-four and seven tenths (34 7/10) feet west of the north line of lot ninety-eight (98), Willets or Oak Grove subdivision, running thence southerly on a straight line making an angle of no degrees, nine and one-half (9 1/2) minutes, west of the west property line of Willets or Oak Grove subdivision for a distance of approximately five hundred seventy-nine (79) feet, thence by a one (1) degree, thirty (30) minutes curve to the right for two (2) degrees, seven (7) minutes to connect with the center line between the tracks as now located, and shall be laid thereon in accordance with the map or plat hereto attached, and being drawing numbered 576-Q; and

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
