A LITERARY FEAST

Ladies of the Woman's Literary Club of Birmingham, Discuss Vital Questions Intelligently.

One of the pleasantest meetings of the year was held by the Club at the home of Mrs. G. R. Ferguson, with 28 members present. The program was "Home Day," the response to roll call was "Home Sentiments."

The Corresponding Secretary read a card from the President of the State Anti-Tuberculosis Association, asking the Club to write our Senator to support Senate Bill No. 109, a bill to provide for reporting occupational diseases by physicians, as it is believed this bill will be of great importance to the state. A motion was made and carried that this request be complied with.

Mrs. Parkinson read a paper entitled "Country-reared vs. City-bred," in which she entertained the advantages of the physical, mental and spiritual training of the child in both the country and the city, with many more to the credit of the former than the latter, but she distinctly emphasized the farm instants of the country village when speaking of the country life.

Mrs. Jones having been appointed leader of the talks and discussion which followed invited the subjects in a very pleasing manner.

Mrs. Hanna Layraale gave a five minute talk on "Cheerfulness in the Home," especially on the part of the mother, or the home maker.

Mrs. Esthes Jameson spoke on "Influences of Environment," saying that heredity gives the bent of the mind, environment trains the mind. She gave Henry Drummond credit for the present common use of the word environment.

Mrs. Edith M. Poole spoke on "Health and Happiness," showing that the latter depended very much upon the former. The paper and the talks were discussed by others present.

Mrs. Gertrude Brown talked of "Furnishment and Fault Finding," quoting good authorities for the former but none for the latter.

Mrs. Ruby Jamieson as accompanist supported Mrs. McFerren who pleased all with a delightful selection.

The hostess furnished refreshments to whom with others who had so kindly entertained the Club during the afternoon, a vote of thanks was extended.

M. U. R. D. C. R.

Detroit to Kalamazoo East Through Interurban Service Will Begin Tuesday, April 4th, Next.

As a result of traffic arrangements between the Detroit United Lines and the Michigan Central, one of the most important steps in electric railway transportation in Michigan, will be taken April 4th, next when a through limited service will be placed in operation between Detroit and Kalamazoo.

The possibility of enlarging the sphere of the interurban service for the benefit of the travelling public has been under consideration by these two great interurban systems for several months, and while the favorable decision was reached some time ago by Officials of both companies, the details have only just been completed. The lines of the M. U. R. are chiefly operated on the third rail system and among the details to be worked out was the equipment of the interurban cars of the Detroit United so that they would operate over the M. U. R. tracks. This small gauge system and the new schedule has been agreed to by the operating departments of the respective companies.

Under the new arrangements there will be limited service leaving Detroit at 6:10 a. m. and every two hours to 10:10 p. m. for Kalamazoo, and leaving Kalamazoo at 6:45 a. m. and every two hours to 4:45 p. m. for Detroit. All these cars will make the usual limited stops of both lines, and will call at important centers as Ypsilanti, Ann Arbor, Jackson and Battle Creek.

No less important is the fact that among the additions to the service will be through limited cars between Detroit and Lansing;—the Capital Limited, that will leave Lansing at 6 a. m. for Detroit via Jackson, and will leave Detroit at 6:10 for Lansing via Jackson.

The running time between Detroit and Kalamazoo will be five hours and five minutes; between Detroit and Lansing, three hours and fifty-five minutes. This in itself will prove a highly attractive feature for business men, and the further fact that the hearts of all cities are traversed will greatly add to the beauties of the journey for pleasure seekers.

All these limited runs will be made without change of cars and the schedules so arranged as to conform with the limited schedules of the other Detroit United Lines. Under the new schedule passengers from Toledo, Saginaw, Flint and Port Huron will travel all the way by electric cars with only a short wait at Detroit.
