ASTER week is one of the busiest seasons of the entire year at the White House in Washington. So much (that) Easter Sunday is for the president and his family a more crowded interval than the first days of other weeks, although it is sufficiently crowded with duties, as, indeed, is every day on the calendar of the presidential household. However, it is the remainder of Easter week rather than the significant holiday that inaugurates it is a time of activity at the first residence in the land.

The merry walk starts off with Easter Monday, but that is no new thing, for Easter Monday has been from the outset of the occasion of the great annual egg rolling in the president's back yard. Nowadays the air of festivity does not depart with the setting sun, but continues for five or six days longer. The secret of it all is that Easter week has become a national custom, a most popular time for visiting the national capital. That is, it is the time chosen by a numerous section of the community—namely, the teachers of our public schools and their pupils. The practice has been growing apace during the past decade until now the school classes invade the seat of government by the thousands each Easter.

But how, perhaps you are asking, does this make work for the president? Very simple—each and every one of these Easter visitors wants to not only see the president, but also to shake hands with him and say "Howdy." Of the thousands upon thousands of eighteenth century that make the capital their mecca at other seasons of the year, the great majority are entirely satisfied when they catch a glimpse of the president at the theater, at church, or walking on the street. Not so, the Easter pilgrims. They want an audience with him, and that is more to the point; they usually so agitate the matter with their respective congressmen and senators—laying stress upon the educational status of the visit—that the makers must in some way secure dates at the White House.

If congress is in session at Easter time there is sure to be an especially heavy influx from the school rooms all over the land, and it is the present occupant of the White House, it seems at least to the pedagogues to feel his endeavors to secure the boon of a reception at the White House for themselves and their charges. And as for the private schools—particularly the "finishing school" for young ladies that send their pupils to Washington at the end of Lent, why any faculty might almost as well resign as arrange a trip to Washington without a "side trip" to the White House. The president is conveyed to church by motor car instead of walking as Roosevelt was wont to do, but he has taken to making up for it latterly by a long walk in the afternoon.

This daily walk, which is especially prolonged on Sundays, if the day be pleasant, is somewhat of a new wrinkle for the chief magistrate. For my part, I do not believe that every day to give him the outdoor exercise that his physician declines to do but he has taken to it. Latterly, however, his enthusiasm for both these pursuits seems to have waned and he is endeavoring to keep physically fit by a regimen of exercise in the White House gymnasium supplemented by the daily walk.

Sometimes the president sets out for a little procession, and yet it is astonishing how many persons pass the president without recognizing him—perhaps because they do not expect to see him engaged in so thoroughly democratic a pursuit. It is one of the passers-by who never fail to spot the distinguished promenade. These are the lecturers on the big sight-seeing automobiles that are seen in such numbers on the city streets. They are likely to discover the approaching president when he is blocks away and their audiences are put on the alert.

A HOLIDAY OF JOY
I have never cared for the much-vaunted Easter bonnet, and have never made sacrifices to that end; but I do associate Easter with a day of the sea. To me the festival of Easter has always been the holiday of all others in the year. It does not mean work nor religious exercise; it does mean unfrustrated joy, and is always spent at Deepsee, France, because I know that at this season the weather is guaranteed, and that I shall be alone for the holiday of my abode on the sands.

I have a religious feeling, it is true; but I never discuss religion with anyone, have always felt that religion is an individual affair, and that one's views should never be forced upon another. Mine is simple and sane, and I am satisfied that it satisfies other lives. Therefore from a religious viewpoint I never try to interfere with the standards of others, which are the standards of my own. But the season of Easter above all others appeals to me for very joy of living.
