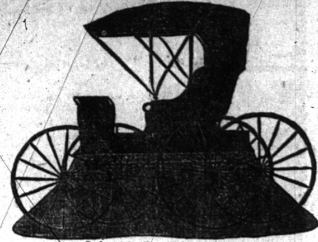

ALL OVER

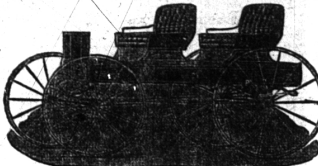

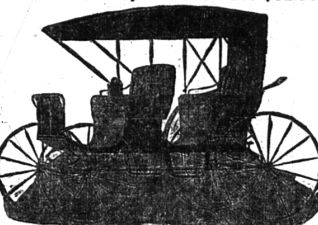
