### Washington

Regulations to further restrict the size and limit the weight of personal baggage of travelers, adopted by substantially all railroads in the United States, was suspended by the interstate commerce commission until April 20.

Elms Root at Washington has accepted the honorary presidency of the American Institute of International Law, formed to promote friendly relations among the nations of the world. A provisional bureau has been opened, with James Brown South, secretary of the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, as president. Alejandro Alvarez, counselor to the minister of foreign affairs of Chile, as secretary general, and Louis Anderson of Costa Rica, treasurer.

On recommendation of Secretary of the Interior Walter L. Fisher, President Taft has decided to reappoint as governor of Hawaii Walter F. Frear, against whom charges were made last spring.

Frank A. Munsey, the publisher, testified before the Clapp committee investigating campaign contributions in Washington, that his total contribution to Colonel Roosevelt's campaign this year had been \$18,000. His pre-convention contribution was \$10,000, and his total campaign was \$8,000, and the balance was given to state committee.

### Domestic

Five men are under arrest and a posse is searching for eight others who attacked Mrs. Little Mullane of Richmond, Va., near Annapolis, Md.

Several persons were injured, some seriously, when spreading rails wrecked the Denver express on the Chicago & Alton railroad, one mile west of Hopeville, Ill.

A general alarm was sent by wireless signals at sea asking that search be made for the tramp steamer Nicaragua, seven days overdue at Port Arthur, Tex., from Tampico, Mex., it is believed, after the vessel was disabled in the recent gulf storm.

The Nicaragua, with Captain Eckhardt and a crew of 23 men, sailed last October 11.

William F. Cashin, a well-to-do member of a paper manufacturing firm, lost his summer home on Long Island sound last week in his sleep Cayuga for New Haven, Conn., where he intended to spend the winter quarters, but nothing was heard of either him or the boat.

Heading the expressed wish of Mrs. Roosevelt, the immense crowd of citizens assembled at the railway station at Oyster Bay, L. I., refrained from making any demonstration upon the arrival of Col. Theodore Roosevelt from Chicago. The Colonel stood the long journey well.

Andrew Rowan, the Arkansas negro who murdered Policeman Carl Roach, was sentenced to life imprisonment at the state penitentiary at Joplin, Mo.

Jack Johnson, the pugilist, was arrested in Chicago on a charge of abducting Little Cameron, a fifteen-year-old white girl, already under arrest on a charge of disorderly conduct. The warrant for Johnson's arrest was sworn out by the girl's mother, Mrs. F. Cameron Falconer, of Minneapolis.

The street railway strike, which has tied up traffic throughout the city for more than a month and resulted in the death of three citizens, is ended. The company granted the men a wage increase of 12 1/2 per cent, and the men consented to arbitrate the matter of 30 men which it accused of violence since the strike began.

The Beach hotel at Lakeside, Mich., a favorite resort among Chicagoans, was destroyed by fire on Saturday. The hotel was insured for \$100,000. The hotel was owned by Mrs. Truit of Chicago, and was patronized last summer by several hundred Chicago families.

Aroused over the labor conditions in the United States, the executive council of the American Federation of Labor has called a meeting at Washington to consider the various phases of the disturbing situation.

The ten-year-old son of Fred Full of La Crosse, Wis., lost his life by hanging in a peculiar manner. On his return from school the strap which was carried over his shoulder caught on a fence post when he attempted to climb over the barrier.

Passengers, crew and life-rafts, who had been leaving fire on board the Merchants and Miners steamer Berkshire for 36 hours, were rescued by the burning liner by the revenue cutter Seminoles, in Lookout cove, North Carolina.

It became known for the first time since the shooting, the exact location of the bullet fired by John Schrank Milwaukee on Oct. 11. The bullet, which it was found by a New York plate, is lodged outside, instead of inside, the fractured rib, and can be removed at any time. Chicago Post-Examiner.

A broken rail caused a Woodmen of the World excursion train on the Illinois Central to stop at Joplin, Mo., and at least fifty people were considerably injured, while a score of the hundred and eighty passengers aboard were badly shaken up.

Bulgaria Signs Pact with Turkey  
Sofia, Bulgaria, Oct. 11.—The proclamation to the Bulgarian nation has been issued by King Ferdinand. It is his recognition of the efforts of the European powers to secure better relations between the people of the Balkans. The king has called his people to arms only after the patience of the Balkan nations has been exhausted.

The proclamation opens with a reference to King Ferdinand's twenty-fifth birthday and says he had hoped that it would have been continued. But Providence has decreed otherwise. The moment has come when the Bulgarian race is called upon to renounce the benefits of peace and to take recourse to arms for the solution of the great problem.

With faith in the protection and support of Almighty, I bring to the cognizance of the Bulgarian nation that this is a war for human rights.

"I order the brave Bulgarian army to march on to Turkish territory!" "Forward! May God be with you!"
