CLARA BARTON'S DEATH

Founder of the Red Cross Society Dies at Her Home in Glen Echo, Md.

Miss Clara Barton, founder of the American Red Cross society, died at her home in Glen Echo, Md., at 10:30 p. m. today.

The cause of her death was chronic pneumonia, with which she was afflicted about 1920. She was 85 years of age.

Her husband, Stephen Barton, of Boston, was with her when she died.

Miss Barton was born in Oxford, Mass., in 1821. Early in the civil war she was a clerk in the patent office at Washington. Her husband later read accounts of the suffering of soldiers in camp and in hospital until she could endure no longer the heartache it gave her. The national military hospital department was at first quite unprepared for the last and suddenly thrown upon it. At length Miss Barton resigned her clerkship to go as a volunteer nurse to the front. She was at the front for 18 months, and contributed to the relief of the soldiers.

She was much good to her and her help do that in 1864 she was appointed to take charge of the hospital of the Michigan division. She was on the field in several battles.
