For Soiled Collars. To clean collar try the following way: Instead of a cloth, which has to be kept in motion for a long while to avoid leaving a ring in place of a spot, use an old tooth brush. Dip it into the naphtha until thoroughly saturated, then a few brisk rubs and the spot or grime has left for parts unknown. The most delicate velvet can be cleaned in this way, though it would not be advisable to use a brush on any fabric like satin.

GIVES A PLEASING FRAGRANCE. Lavender Spread to Cover Sheets and Pillow Cases When They Are Put Away in Linen Closet.

This is to lay over the sheets and pillow cases in the linen closet or chest. It can be made any size, or conceal, but to sweeten, says Women's Home Companion, get enough pale lavender, Japanese crepe to cover two sides of a long sheet of white cotton wadding. Split open the wadding and sprinkle in a great many dried lavender blossoms; fold the wadding together again, cover it with the crepe, which should be fastened together with the edge carefully turned in. If you will fold in a full inch everywhere there will be no necessity for slip stitching them together, because you can arrange a lining of narrow lavender ribbon round the four sides. This will appear to be lined, but will be crossed over the edge and sewed in place, because the combination of crepe and wadding will scarcely ad-
