Ann Arbor—Mrs. Francis Dewey was found guilty of the murder of her eleven-month-old adopted child.

Lansing—When the gong sounded an alarm of fire at central fire station Edward Talmadge, like some of the other firemen, hopped from his cot in the dormitory and hurriedly began dressing. He had no more than stuck his feet into his slippers and pulled his suspenders up over his shoulders before the loud noise and he was enveloped in a cloud of dust. When the air had cleared, he saw that the pillow piece of plaster covered the huge piece of his head but a few minutes before. A spot about four feet square had been located from the ceiling and fallen upon the cot. Talmadge carried away two bushels of the heavy plaster. If it had not been for the alarm of fire Talmadge would have been seriously injured, if not killed.

King, who has been living in Detroit and who came to Port Huron to take up his future residence here, made the discovery of his father's body. Kirk happened to be going on a fishing trip and passing his father's home decided to stop for a few minutes. Calling Kirk receiving no response, the son made his way to the rear yard, where he came across his father's dead body.

Pontiac—Frank Howers, aged nineteen, a chauffeur employed by Mrs. W. C. Turk, 154 North Saginaw street, has been arrested on a charge of sending threatening communications to Dr. H. Wells of West Lawrence street. Recently Howers has received several threatening letters, some of which were sent through the mails and some slipped under his door. Lansing—State Geologist R. C. Allen has returned from the peninsula of the state and announces that the camp of his department this summer will be located at Waterside, in Gogebic county. The party will be composed of Geologists Allen, R. A. Smith, Bert Fellows and others, but not yet selected. An investigation of the mining properties between the river and Gogebic range will be made. The party will have Lansing, June and camp will not be broken until October.

Owosso—John Rice, ticket agent here, was held up by a masked man, who rifled the cash drawer and obtained \$15, besides compelling Rice to surrender a watch and a pair of cufflinks. The robber furnished two revolvers, one of which covered the agent constantly. The police believe that the holdup was the work of an amateur who had been reading nickel novels.

Menominee—Clara, two-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Schoenke, died as the result of eating a quantity of poisonous woodier called ground hemlock.

Potosky—William Cunningham was a member of the herd and strike of a mile north of here and received \$25 by three masked men armed with revolvers. Cunningham says they sprang at him from a truck and he was returning from Potosky to his home at Bay View.

EXCELLENT USE FOR FRESH BONES

Best Plan is to Run Them Through a Cutter for the Purpose of Selling Them to the Local Dealer.

For fresh bones the best use is to run them through a bone cutter for the poultry or sell them to the local dealer for the same purpose. Sometimes there appears no market or use for old bones, and with these the following plans may be tried. The result will still be rather good, but good for vines and trees. Bones and fresh waste ashes are placed in alternate layers, making the first and last layers of ashes, until the barrel is full. The whole is kept slightly moist. After three or four months the mass may be turned over once or twice for three months, when it will be ready for use. Another method is to mix them with manure of the same kind, keeping the whole moist with urine.

Grading Up a Herd.

If the milk of the entire herd is rather low in butter fat, a sire from a strain having a good record for butter-fat production should be secured. Careful breeding is the only effective method of raising the average richness of herd milk. The process is somewhat slow, but if promptly begun, very encouraging results may be realized after the second year. Each successive year will add to the value of the herd and to the satisfaction of the owner.
