## Most Important Happenings Told in Brief

### Washington

Tariff legislation will be pressed by the Democratic majority of the United States senate from now until the close of the session, under an agreement reached in a caucus. Senator Simmons was selected to lead the Democratic fight.

The charge that E. H. Allen Hitchcock, while secretary of the Interior, had permitted the Santa Fe railroad to exchange useless lava beds for valuable timber and that the public domain was made in the senate by Senator Crawford.

The interstate commission held that where a railroad has a wharf to which its traffic over delivery and at which part of the shipping public is engaged, the wharf becomes a public terminal.

President Taft expects to go to Beverly, Mass., for his summer vacation about July 1 regardless of conditions in the political arena and regardless of what congress may be doing.

### Domestic

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Frank Kramer of St. Louis, a carpenter, whose hobby for collecting clocks caused his wife to sue for divorce, finds solace from his domestic troubles in his workshop.

Jack Minor of Madison, Wis., was knocked unconscious and severely injured internally when his motorcycle struck an automobile.

The strike of the Detroit baseball players is off. The players who struck with Cobb when he was paid off for punching a New York spectator who insulted him, and refused to play after he was punished, reached an agreement with Philadelphia with President Navin of their club, and President Johnson of their league.

Five persons, three men and two women, were drowned when the automobile in which they were riding plunged into the Calumet river at the Ninety-second street bridge, Chicago.

Attorney General Wickham has moved against the breaking of the alien valorization scheme. In a petition in equity filed in the United States court in New York the valorization plan is declared to be a violation of the Sherman anti-trust law.

W. E. Guthrie, a Canadian accused of forging a check for \$100,000, was sentenced to jail at Little Rock, Ark., that he killed Dr. Helen Knabe, who was mysteriously murdered in her apartments at Indianapolis several months ago.

The Bethlehem Steel company of Harrisburg, Pa., filed a suit with the state authority of an authorized increase of its capital stock from \$29,500,000 to \$75,000,000.

Morris and Max Roset, private bankers of New York, filed papers in bankruptcy, showing liabilities of \$700,000 and apparent assets of \$342,000.

President John Kirby, Jr., in opening the annual meeting of the National Association of the Blind at New York, called for the formation of a new party whose aim shall be the preservation of the United States government.

While endeavoring to raise the body of James Doyle from the floor at his home in New London, Conn., Mrs. Alexander Robb, a neighbor, was severely attacked by Doyle's bulldog and before the animal could be driven away she was severely bitten.

Secretaries of Farmers' Grain Dealers' associations of Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Nebraska, Illinois and Iowa completed plans at Minneapolis for an organization to help brace the 150,000 farmers now holding membership in state associations.

Four hundred Democratic women of Washington celebrated the birthday of the late president at a harmony breakfast, those who were in attendance, wives and daughters of many of the party's past and present leaders.

Rev. Dr. Homer C. Stuntz was elected bishop of the Methodist Episcopal church in the general conference in Minneapolis. He received 377 votes out of a possible 592.

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### Clarence V. T. Hichson has paid the penalty for the murder of the late Senator.

The former clergyman was electrocuted in the Charlestown (Mass.) state prison. The condemned man walked to the electric chair with more firmness and courage than had been expected by those who had observed him for the past few weeks.

### Another international marriage with a valuable title as the prize was legally rated as an absolute failure when Countess Agnes Alexander Dudley von Mourmél de Godeffroy once again became plain Miss Irma Klugner, daughter of a Chicago manufacturer.

The marriage, annulled by Judge Brennan in Chicago, was a failure.

Several members of a band of apaches were arrested in a Dolomite, Ill. and forced to give up \$40 taken from two aged farmers.

Two persons were drowned and sixty were injured when a portable gantry on the Puget sound excursion steamer Flier at Seattle, Wash., collapsed. One hundred and fifty persons were thrown into the water by the accident. Quick work and many acts of heroism characterized the rescues.

The old-time rule of the Methodist Episcopal church was changed to allow games of chance, stand theaters or play games of chance, stands unchanged. The Methodist general conference in Kansas City, Mo., voted to change the rule.
