

The occasion was the 56th anniversary of securing his first job, and he says that everything that followed has been the result of thrift, industry and some business sense and skill. The job was that of book-keeper in a Circinnati river-front forwarding house. He proved to be a good accountant-one of the first-on-the-job and lastto-leave sort. One year later his salary was raised to \$25 a month, he began to sate money, and the next year le was in business for himself.
