REPORT OF THE CONDITION OF THE FIRST STATE SAVINGS BANK

At Birmingham, Michigan, at the close of business April 15, 1912, as called for by the Comptroller of the Banking Department.

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Clean-up Day Friday, May 10

On that day every one is asked to put the finishing touches on the season's clean-up. Let us have the neatest town in the county. You are expected to pick up all the rubbish in your front and back yards, streets and alleys, and dispose of it. Fill boxes and barrels and place in front of house where it will be convenient to load into wagons. Then hand a notice to the Village Marshal, saying that you have a box or barrel and give your street and number. The Village will provide a team to take it away. Remember the date and that it is so ordered by the Village President.
