

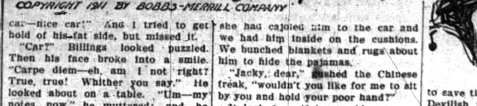
Gov. Osborn Has Designated June 14 as Day to be Observed

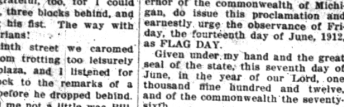
"An-and, dash it, the frump from China! She gave a little scream and fell on Billings' neck, almost bearing him to the ground."
