

SEVEN WEEKS' EVENTS

Latest News of Interest Boiled Down for the Busy Man.

Politics

The Republican national committee went up its hearing of contests at Chicago with a decision giving to Colonel Roosevelt the two delegates from the Fourth district of North Carolina. Previously President Taft had been awarded 62 delegates from Texas, Virginia, Washington and the District of Columbia and Roosevelt had been given four of the thirty Texas delegates contested by the Taft people. Of the total 244 contests at the outset, President Taft was given 131 and Roosevelt 113.

Although the Democratic national convention will not assemble at Baltimore until June 25, some of the delegates and committeemen who are in that city are of the opinion that the convention will be extended beyond the time set for its adjournment, owing to the prospect of a long-drawn-out fight in the Republican convention at Chicago.

Theodore Roosevelt, accompanied by Mrs. Roosevelt, his son Herbert W. Howland and Regis H. Post, former governor of Ohio, Taft, Theodore Douglas Robinson, his nephew, George B. Roosevelt, a cousin, and Secretary and Mrs. Harper, is in Chicago to personally look after his presidential campaign.

Washington

The senate at Washington passed Senator Smoot's bill permitting agricultural entries on Alaskan coal lands, providing entry reserve to the government all in the land for which patents were obtained.

The senate at Washington passed a bill authorizing the transfer of all Apache Indian prisoners of war held on the Fort Sill military reservation in Oklahoma to their old home on the Mesquero Apache reservation in New Mexico.

The senate at Washington adopted resolutions of Senator Heyburn of Idaho directing the secretary of the navy and war departments to inform the senate whether or not any flag is ever raised above the Stars and Stripes on any vessel, fort, emplacement or building coming under their respective departments.

Between thirty and forty persons were fatally injured in a cyclone which swept over the Ozark nation in Oklahoma. The cyclone was also attended with great property loss. The town of Nelsoy was completely swept away.

Following the receipt of official dispatches from the American legation in Santiago, Cuba, telling of a rebel by Gen. Julio Antonech, the threat leader of the anti-foreigners and reduce the United States military and naval forces in the San Juan district, the navy department ordered an additional battleship, the Nebraska, from Key West to Guantanamo.

The Associated Harvard clubs convened in New York and paraded to the right of franchise, Representative Fisher of Wisconsin, in the house at Washington, presented a petition with more than 16,000 signatures, and leads with 15,832 names; New York is second with 12,178, while Pennsylvania and Illinois are represented by over 10,000 each.

Personal

Foreign

Abolition of duties on certain articles to be used by manufacturers has been announced at Ottawa, Ont. Sporting

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Domestic

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27 KILLED BY CYCLONE

High Wind Sweeps Over Kansas City and Adjoining County.
Twenty-seven are known to have been killed when a cyclone swept over Kansas City and vicinity late Saturday night.

Police reports indicate that the storm swept to the south through Bates county where it left a trail of death and destruction. The path of the storm was half a mile wide and five miles long. In Kansas City two fatalities were reported and Mervin and Adrian nineteen persons were killed. At Creighton in Cass county 250 persons were killed and 100 others have been killed.
