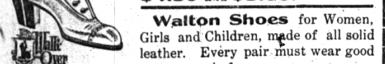

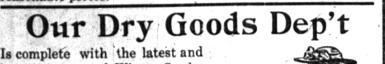

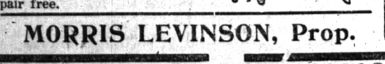

George Code last week lost his old reliable horse, aged 32 years. Died of old age, George certainly felt badly.

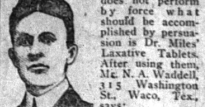
