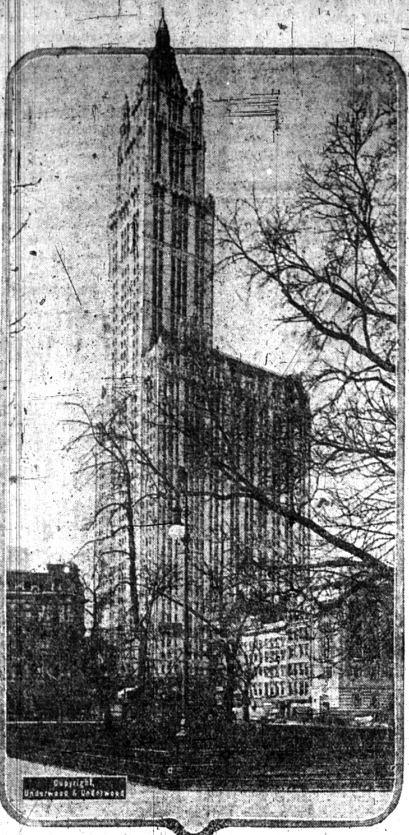

Infidelity Found in Parcel Post.

Patrons of the parcel post in the northern part of the United States have discovered they are unable in all cases to send packages the full fifty miles prescribed as the extent of the first zone.

This is due to the fact that a degree of longitude is considerably shorter in the northern than in the southern part of the country.

The phenomenon has led to the complaint that parcel post patrons are being overcharged on first zone distances and to the suspicion that a mistake was made in the working out of the zone maps. The department states, however, that the variation is unavoidable and that no injustice is involved.

Michigan Office Holders May Keep Jobs.

The latest development in the senate hold-up of presidential appointments is that Michigan's postmasters, customs international revenue, judicial and other republican appointees of office may continue in office indefinitely after the inauguration of Woodrow Wilson.

Michigan will be one of the few states in the Sixty-third congress represented by two republican senators. The rule laid down a few days ago by the democrats of the senate may then be read back at them.

25,000 Albanians Slain by Serbs.
Twenty-five thousand Albanians have been "more or less wantonly" killed in the Turkish province of Kosovo by the Serbian regulars and irregulars since the invasion by them of European Turkey, according to the Reichpost of Vienna.

The newspaper demands the dispatch of a European commission of inquiry to investigate the reports of horrible atrocities.

Rep. James Henry, of county, opposed the state for contagious diseases law, planning to introduce a bill at the present session of the legislature to have the commission discharge and its work in Michigan declared null.

U. S. Interested in P. M.'s Train.

Postmaster General Hitchcock is going to take a hand in the proposal by the Pere Marquette railway to discontinue train No. 1, running between Detroit and Chicago.

If the Pere Marquette persists it may forfeit every mail-carrying contract it now has with the United States.

The head of the postoffice department is known to take the stand that it is not proper for railroads, for the sake of escaping a temporary loss, to obstruct the operation of federal mail trains.

It is further known that Postmaster General Hitchcock is of the opinion that railroads should not be allowed to discontinue the mail service on one route without being made to suffer on other routes. Many mail contracts are renewable about this time and if the train in question, which carries heavy mails, is withdrawn, it is likely to affect negotiations as to other routes in the state.

No Inaugural Ball for Wilson.

"There will be no inaugural ball," declared William C. Eustice, chairman of the inaugural committee, after an informal conference with several members over President-elect Wilson's letter requesting that the committee consider the feasibility of omitting the function.

"The wishes of President-elect Wilson will be complied with," said Mr. Eustice. "The committee will take official action later."

Gov. Wilson pointed out that use of the pension office building, where the inaugural balls have been held for generations, would mean a costly stoppage of government work.

The suggestion was made that, instead of a ball, President and Mrs. Wilson receive at a formal reception, to be held in the rotunda of the capitol.

Calhoun county will no longer divide smallpox and other contagious diseases between competing physicians. Hereafter the health officers will do all the work and, if necessary, employ doctors to help them.

The Northern Gas & Oil Co., owning and operating the newly struck oil field at Allagan, has increased its capital from \$20,000 to \$50,000.

WOLVERINE NEWS BRIEVITIES

Potosky.—After ten or twelve years of solitary life in a dingy, dirty cabin on the outskirts of Potosky, Frank A. Jenna, the mysterious hermit, was determined insane and is inmate of the state hospital at Traverse City. Where Jenna came from is not known. He has appeared regularly in Potosky and nearby towns, dressed in rags and with hands about his feet in place of shoes. He was under the hallucination that he was a great teacher of music, and it is true that he has written instrumental pieces which have been published and which bear his name, some of them being considered of high grade.

Flint.—Fire of unknown origin destroyed the Buick brass and aluminum factory, known as factory No. 15, at a loss officially estimated at \$50,000. As a result of the fire 250 men are temporarily out of work and the whole Buick plant is seriously handicapped. The enforced idleness will not extend beyond this department as enough brass has been turned out ahead to keep the factory running for several weeks. The foundry will be rebuilt at once. The flames spread quickly throughout the building and many employees barely had time to escape. There are no serious injuries reported.

Battle Creek.—Fire in the Eldred block, a three-story structure in the center of the business district, spread to several adjoining buildings and caused a loss estimated at \$200,000. Among the burned buildings are the Eldred block, the Hiram block, the Kapp block and the Best theater. Jacob Weidemann, dry goods merchant, is the heaviest loser, the damage to his store being placed at \$75,000. Foster & Gordon's shoe store and a restaurant also were destroyed. The losses are partly covered by insurance. The thoroughness of the fire was expected to recover.

Lansing.—Governor Ferris delivered a short address to the Michigan Improved Stock Breeders' association, which closed its session at the Michigan Agricultural college. The chief executive urged more scientific farming and better business methods. He told the members of the association of the experiences he met while tilling the soil in New York. The meeting proved to be the largest on record, as were also the sessions of the subordinate associations.

Albion.—John A. Hubbard, arrested in Cleveland, O., Tuesday on an embezzlement charge of account of his disappearance last July with over \$200 belonging to Albion Arthur of Gleaners, was arraigned on his arrival here. He demanded a new examination, which was set for January 25. His friends here furnished \$1,000 bail and he was released. No trace has yet been found of Mrs. Earl Wood of Marquette with which it is alleged Hubbard eloped in July.

Ypsilanti.—While fooling with a revolver at the durometer of a local league organization, Frank Powell shot and killed Isaac Colvert. Several witnesses declare the shooting was accidental, but Powell has been arrested and will be held pending the inquest. The bullet entered Colvert's right side and passed clear through the body. Colvert was thirty years of age.

Port Huron.—William S. Kirby has been held to the federal grand jury for the alleged theft of stamps from the post office at Clifford and released on bonds of \$500. A small number of stamps were inconspicuously marked and placed where they could be easily taken. Later the stamps were found and secret service officers allege they traced them to Kirby, who then was a rural carrier.

Cheboygan.—Six Cheboygan public school teachers are quarantined at a local boarding house because one of them, Miss Rachel Dreier, has diphtheria. A number of other cases of the disease have broken out in the last few days and may result in closing the schools.

Ray City.—Chairman George Harting of the supervisors announced he would submit a plan for a north and south state road at the convention of supervisors in Saginaw next week. Mr. Harting's proposal will be a substitute for the plan of the Roscommon board for a road along the principal meridian, and will suggest using the good roads already built through the best populated country from Detroit to the straits.

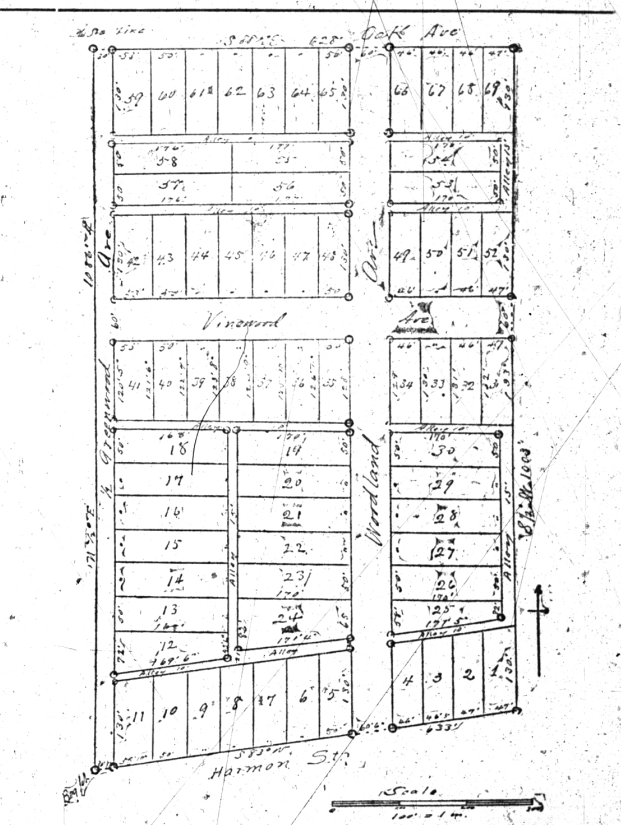
Alpena.—Arthur Ledue, twenty-one-year-old son of former Landlord Ledue of the Alpena house, was arrested charged with inciting a riot following three fires at that Ford.

Lansing.—According to L. L. Wright, superintendent of public instruction, the health of thousands of children is being menaced in Michigan because school boards have failed to arrange for proper heating and ventilation. "The oxygen of the average school room unrefreshed in half an hour, after which the children are forced to breathe over and over impure, germinous air," he said, "impairs the resistance power of every child against disease."

Reed City.—Several days ago a silver fox valued at many dollars was caught near Reed City, a town eight miles northwest of here which prompted many people to go hunting. Among them was Otto Miller, with his pointer dog and a silver fox gun and three Frenchmen, one named Bodey. The foreman the dog stopped and pointed. Miller could see nothing, but raised his gun and fired, shooting the three men, two of whom, it is said, by physicians from the city, will die.
