## Ball Cows Sewed by Hand.

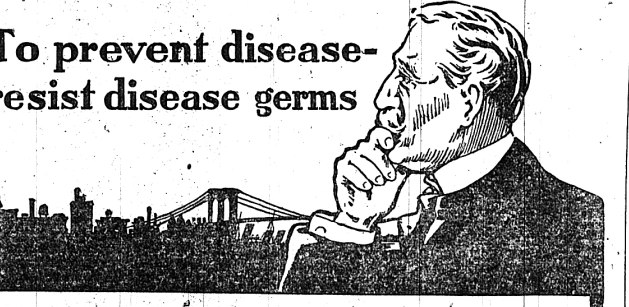
