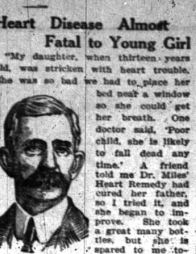

## OBITUARY.

**IRA THOMAS JOHNSON**  
Ira Thomas Johnson was born in Southern Michigan July 13, 1876, where he resided with his parents until April 1880 when the family removed to Birmingham.

He attended the Birmingham High School, and later was associated with his father in the livery business for several years.

He has traveled extensively through out the United States. He lived for eighteen months in San Francisco shortly before the earthquake, traveled as a seaman through the eastern and southern states, and lived for several months in New Orleans where he had the Southern Agency for the Underwriters Fire Extinguishers, leaving the city just before the Yellow Fever quarantine shut off escape.

For the past several years he has resided in Birmingham with his parents, where he passed away March 25 1913 at 2:15 p. m. after an illness of over six weeks, during which time he was a great sufferer. All that an adoring family could do for an only son and brother, all that medical science in the hands of skilled specialists and physicians who fought valiantly for his life could do, was gone.

His chief characteristics were his happy, optimistic view of life, a certain tact and courtesy in all his relations, loyalty to his associates, and especially to his own family, and an eager willingness to catch hold and help who were in need of his sympathy or assistance.

He was unusually considerate of the comfort of others, even near the end when almost unconscious. The love which he constantly expressed for his mother during his illness was a beautiful tribute to motherhood. There was never a kinder son and brother.

Besides his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Johnson, there remain to mourn his loss two sisters, Nina B. Johnson and Mrs. Edgar A. Parks, and a large number of close friends here and in other cities.

Many exquisite floral offerings bore mute testimony to the esteem in which he was held.

The funeral was held Friday, March 28 at the home, Rev. Cassius E. Wakefield of the Methodist Episcopal Church, officiating, assisted by the Rev. F. F. Craft of St. James Church. The opening song was Alfred Tennyson's "Crossing the Bar", and the closing hymn, "Lead Kindly Light."

The pall bearers, friends of the deceased, were Messrs. George Wiser, Fred Crawford, Tom Tharby, Guy Taylor and Tom Cobb of Birmingham, and Frank Coleman of Flint.

After the services the remains were laid to rest in beautiful Greenwood cemetery beside the well loved sister, Ethel, who passed on nearly two years ago, and near the dear grandmother, Mrs. Nancy J. Beddow, who departed the third of last January.
