SUCCESSFUL JRS. THE LAST CONCERT

An Excellent Program Was Presented by the Juniors of the High School last Fri. Night.

The Junior class of the High school presented a most excellent program last Friday evening, when the annual Junior Exhibition was given at the Baptist church.

The class had been working faithfully for the success of the program as the results showed. The evening was opened with the Presentation of the dress of welcome given by Ernest Burtraw and followed by a reading "Bobby Shafto" by Mildred McKinney. Gladys Brooks one of the musical members of the class gave a piano solo "A. Martin" by Godard. A reading "Overhead at the Academy" by Martha Nye proved a very effective number as did the declamation "A Message to Garcia" which was well recited by Earl O'Connell. Mr. Burtraw and the boys set to work a very beautiful serenade, Mr. Burtraw taking the solo parts. A particularly pleasing reading was that given by Elnie Mitchell "The Death Bridge over the Tay." The class was well handled by Hal Schlaack who related the most interesting episodes of class life in the last three years. Burns masterpiece "The Cotter's Saturday Night" was given a sympathetic interpretation by Anna Yacht. Mr. Albert Danham, the soloist of the evening was very enthusiastically received by the audience who greatly enjoyed the two vocal numbers he presented. The declamation "The Decision of the Rebels" by Young Moore was read on the program to the pleasing reading by Miss Hartwell "The Perfect Tribute," which is an episode concerning the Gettysburg address and was a very pleasing number. The first part of the program was brought to a close with a song by the girls' octet, followed by an original class poem by Gladys Hansen, and class song, sung by the class.

As there was a number of very good voices in this class the song was a decided success.

The remaining six members of the Class, for the second part of the program, presented the german play "Egmont." Much credit is due these students, and Miss Connelly who drilled them for this work, as they translated the play into English as part of their regular class work, and gave their own translation of it. Charles Spencer, the german butler, and Mabel Danham as the german maid, were clever. Iva Hamilton made a very delightful little german bride, and Allen Brown was particularly well cast in the part of Alfred, the young husband. Raymond Peck as "Andorf," the rich gentleman, and Carolyn Hays, the bride's mother acted their parts perfectly much to the enjoyment of the audience.

The church was prettily decorated with the Class colors, green and white; the colors being carried out in masses of white lilacs and honyasuckle, and all members of the Class wore the class flower—Lilies of the Valley.

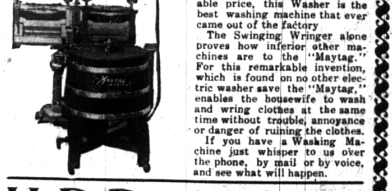
