Fred Nyrens, chief clerk of the Waters-Pierce Oil company for five years at Oklahoma City, Okla., was arrested on a charge of having embezzled \$75,000.

Prof. J. Turner Horner of Purdy, Mo., and his wife, Miss May Horner, are among those who receive diplomas when the forty-second class of Denby college graduated at Springfield, Mo., Feb. 25.

Sammuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, underwrote a second operation for a mastoid abscess in Washington.

Vice-President Marshall was invested with the honorary degree of doctor of laws by the University of North Carolina. He delivered his principal address before the graduating class.

The celebration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the accession of Emperor William of Germany opened in Berlin.

Dr. Forbes Winslow, the widely known and successful physician, died suddenly at his home in London, Jan. 15. He was sixty-nine years old.

Miss Emily Widling Davidson died in the Episcopal hospital, where she was admitted in a critical condition after having thrown herself in front of the king's horse, Anmer, during the running of the Derby race.

Hundred and ten bodies—the dead of both sides killed in the fighting about Maximopolis—were placed on a pyre and burned. No words of prayer or funeral service was held.
