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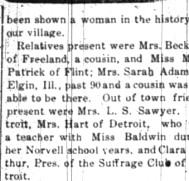


HER EARTHLY TOIL IS COMPLETED

Miss Martha Baldwin, Birmingham's Beloved and Most Widely-Known Resident, Laid to Rest in Beautiful Greenwood.

Monday of this week in the afternoon the last rites, the funeral services of Miss Martha Baldwin were held from her late home and was largely attended by friends filling the home to overflowing.

The Ladies' Literary Club attended in a body, and every member was present numbering 30 and all wearing the club colors pink and green. They presented a large bouquet of flowers. Rev. Shippen, Unitarian minister of Detroit conducted the services, assisted

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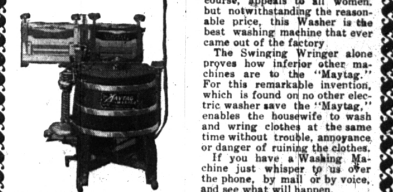
