Harvey Carter told times before the Greenwood Cemetery was ever even thought of. Dr. Ebenezer Raynaile, father of Dr. C. M. Raynaile, was the first to originate the idea of giving the Birmingham graveyard a thought. Before he gave it his attention, we all remember at a time in which cows fed at will and hogs roamed over the grounds undisturbed, and the land. The plants, if they were covered with a thin layer of earth, were right. There was a species of moss and the plant called myrtle. At this time the Birmingham graveyard was a disgrace to civilization. Dr. E. Raynaile wrought a great change, but he was not alone. He brought in and undated by and under care, and later Miss M. Baldwin became interested and proved the founder of the Greenwood Cemetery association.
