RESOLUTION IS PRESENTED IN SENATE ASKING STRIKE PROBE.

MICHIGAN SENATOR OPPOSES SUCH ACTION.

Lively Tilt Follows Introduction of Resolution for Government Investigation of Copper Strike.

Washington—Thorough investigation of strike conditions in the copper mines in the Calumet, Hancock and South Range districts of Michigan was proposed in a resolution Monday by Senator Ashurst of Arizona.

The Michigan senator charged that political expediency prompted the action and that such an investigation would be a victory for the courts of his state.

Engineer William Grandow, of Grand Rapids, was scalded fatally. The fireman, Fred Hebelmyer, of Grand Rapids, was injured, and one hundred and fifty passengers escaped injury.

The train was in charge of Conductor J. M. Wreck. The locomotive was totally demolished and three coaches derailed.

Men Bearing the Name of Hugh Williams Apparently 'Are Immune From Death by Drowning.'

Among many English seafaring men there is a tradition that no man blessed with the name of Hugh Williams ever died at sea—a tradition based on one of the most remarkable series of coincidences ever recorded in the logs of those who go down to the sea in ships.

The last and most remarkable instance of this immunity of Hugh Williams from death at sea occurred in 1885, when a coal barge was caught in a storm in the North sea and went down.

There were nine men on board, and all were lost except two, who were uncle and nephew and each of whom was named Hugh Williams.

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
