TAKES HER LIFE

Miss Mary Robinson, 32, Took Her Own Life at the Home of E. C. Huston Monday Forenoon.

Miss Mary Robinson, 32, employed in the home of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Huston, ended her life Monday morning at the Huston home by drinking two ounces of carbolic acid. This following note, which is believed to explain the act, was found on the dresser in her room: "Birmingham, Oct. 15.—Dear mother and sister: Don't feel bad about what I am going to do. It is awful I know but there is no pleasure any more for me in this world, so I am going to try and get to the mark. I know God will be there for me and all will be right. I have a few requests to make. There is money in the bank to bury me with and I want it paid once, as soon as the work is done. And mother can have what I leave and the other things. You can keep them or give them away. I want you to enjoy your life. I want the funeral services held at Birmingham and I want Dr. Jamieson to preach the services and the very short. No one is to blame but myself, so I don't feel bad. If there is anything I have done wrong I want you to forgive me for I am going to trust in the Lord and give my life to Him. Please don't mourn for me. Be joyful yourselves. With love to all. May."

MAUSOLEUM AT ROSELAND PARK CEMETERY

DEDICATION SERVICES SUNDAY, OCT. 18, AT 2:30 P. M.

On Sunday, Oct. 18, 1914, the beautiful community mausoleum at Roseland Park cemetery will be dedicated with appropriate ceremonies at 2 o'clock p. m. The exercises will consist of addresses by leading Deacons and vocal selections. The public is cordially invited to attend these ceremonies. The Roseland Park mausoleum is of the Doric style of architecture and its beautiful lines suggest to the observer the grandeur of ancient Greek or Roman workmanship. This great building is 450 feet around and covers about 14,000 feet of surface. In a perfect month and more substantial than 1/2 out from the building is white marble and there are 1,300 crypts, 650 on each floor, and one of the main features of the building has been done by, as it were, having these crypts in the building but not of it. The ventilation and sanitation of the crypts makes them as separate and distinct from the corridors as if they were outside of the building. Here, without the anxiety of seeing the remains of their loved ones enshrouded in mother earth, the living can securely lay their dead to a safe and guarded rest in a home that is everlastingly beautiful. Birmingham Choral Society Will Bloomfield Hills Hunt Association Will Hold Initial Meet October 24. 2,500 Acre Territory Used. The initial run of the Bloomfield Hills Hunt association will be held Saturday, October 24. Already sufficient land privileges have been granted to insure a riding territory of over 2,500 acres. The bounds of the Grose Pointe Hunt club will be kenneled in the vicinity and the members' horses stabled nearby. Considering the number of enthusiastic riders in the neighborhood, good-sized crowds are expected. Through the courtesy of the Bloomfield Hills Country club, the privileges of the club-house have been extended to members of the hunt association. Bloomfield Hills affords one of the most attractive stretches of country for a hunt.
