### Home Improvement Advice

VALVE OF THE COVER CROPS  
Object is to Add Moiver to Soil and Turn it Back to Farm as Nature Prepares in Beginning.

Fall sowing of such or cover crops in the orchard and on ground that has had a crop removed by the harvest is a good plan in many instances. The farmer is to add manure to the soil and turn it back to the farm as nature prepared in the beginning. In many soils the mineral elements remain but the humus has been removed by successive cropping of land.

The average soil of many orchards shows a considerable amount of potash, phosphate and other necessary elements; by sowing of leguminous crop nitrogen is added to the soil and a large amount of cheap fertility obtained.

Where a cover crop, such as crimson clover, hairy vetch, cowpeas, soy beans, etc., are sowed on ground after last cultivation, and then turned under in late fall or early spring, not only is fertility increased, but this green manure acts as a sponge, makes soil more porous, and holds water longer. It is lighter and makes the soil darker, hence warmer in the early spring.

## WOULD DWARF FRUIT TREES

Pomologist of Department of Agriculture Presents Novel Proposition to Increase Yield.  
A novel proposition to increase the orchard yield of the country by dwarfing all fruit trees and plants was advocated by Prof. C. P. Close, a pomologist of the department of agriculture, in a lecture on "The Home Fruit Garden," delivered before the Washington Y. M. C. A. Professor Close's lecture was one of others delivered by experts of the department designed to help the city man reduce the cost of living by teaching him how to grow fruit vegetables and flowers in his own back yard.

## FRUIT PICKING MADE EASY

Work Simplified by Use of Device Patented by Southern Inventor.  
Fruit picking should certainly be simplified by the use of a new device just patented by a Southern inventor. The invention comprises a bamboo made of a fixed and a movable member.

Convenient Fruit Picker.  
This invention comprises a basket provided with a handle, the movable member is so constructed that pivoted that it turns and in so doing its teeth pass the slots of the fixed portion of the frame as the user draws fruit to be picked from the tree is approached by this device—mounted on a long pole held by the person standing on the ground—and when the stem of the fruit is between the teeth, a string is pulled and the stem is cut by the movable blades. The fruit then drops into the basket, which is ready to receive it.

Practice to be Encouraged.  
Cover cropping in orchard is a practice that should come into more general use.  
Care for New Grapes.  
If the wax of newly set grafts becomes cracked, or allows the rain and air to the graft, press it in place or apply more.  
Many Things to Avoid.  
The only way to surely avoid plum blight, cherry troubles, potato scab, corn smut, etc., is to have none of these things on the place.  
Save the Windfalls.  
Save all the windfalls by making the apples into cider.
