

WILL STRIKE 100,000 MICHIGAN HOMES

Judge, eminent Lawyer, numerous Insurance Commissioners, well-known Fraternalists, and Citizens generally, condemn the provisions of the proposed Amendment. Every Fraternal Society, including Ball-ways Organizations, Trade Unions and Commercial Travelers, have taken up the proposed Amendment.
