Chief of Police Joe Ogden was shot in the head by Samuel Atkinson of Broomfield, Ill. Ogden's condition is reported to be serious.

Three persons were killed and the fourth seriously injured in an automobile accident in Milwaukee automobile history, those killed being among the most prominent people in Milwaukee.

Paul O. Hastings, Democrat, has moved over Governor Francis F. Cook's Republican ticket in the race for United States senator of Wisconsin, according to official returns.

Twenty-five acres of cattle pens, one-third of the Kansas City stock yards, have been destroyed by fire, with a loss estimated at \$750,000.

M. B. Summers, former cashier of the First National Bank of New York, W. Va., and C. B. Martin were sentenced to five years in the penitentiary by Judge A. G. Day at Wheeling, W. Va. They were accused of embezzling \$30,000 of the bank's funds.

When hunting, Rudolph Prots, eight-year-old boy, became entangled at his twelve-year-old brother, Walter, and shot the lad through the heart with a small rifle at Thief River Falls, Minn.

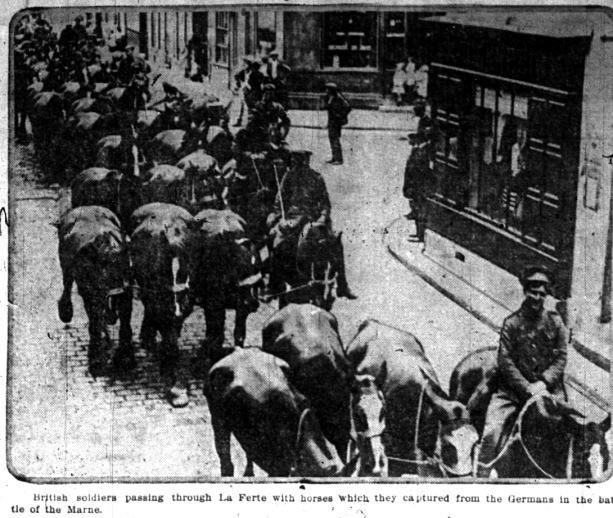
Four bandits shot Nicholas Varado, nineteen years old, an employee of the Central Scientific company of Chicago, in the suburbs of that city, containing \$1,300 while he was on his way to a bank.

Declaring that "the power to declare war must be put in the hands of the people or their chosen representatives," the executive council of the American League for Peace made its report to the thirty-fourth annual convention of that body, which convened at Philadelphia.

The Missouri, Kansas & Texas railroad in the Supreme court at Washington in its appeal against a tax amount for \$61,000,000, the value of the 3,000,000 acres of land in the state of Oklahoma which the railroad claimed to own, was granted by the United States 50 cents a year.

William J. Hartley and James J. Garner, recently officials of the Texas mills to defraud purchasers of raw books, were sentenced at New York to a term of two years in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta.

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EMDEN ESCAPES BRITISH CRUISER

SHOE AND RIFLE PUT FIRST

German Military Authorities Attach Importance to These Two Details of Equipment.

At Berlin there is a government museum devoted entirely to hygiene, and among the exhibits are different kinds of shoes and boots, with labels indicating their relative merit for marching purposes.

There are two things which a German officer cannot pardon; one is a lack of efficiency of the soldier's rifle, the other an ill-fitted foot. In either case the soldier is immediately punished.

The secret of the uniform excellence of the Germans as regards their marching power lies in the training they receive. When they enter their company as recruits the first thing impressed on their minds is the importance of the shoe and rifle.

In the spring, when the snow is off the ground, marches are undertaken and these are regulated as carefully as the strokes and courses of the college crew under the hands of the trainer.

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CRUISER EMDEN IS DESTROYED BY THE SYDNEY

Australian War Craft Finally Disposes of Boat Which Makes Much Trouble

RUSSIA CLAIMS VICTORIES IN EAST THEATRE OF WAR

Official Reports From Vienna Say That Russians Have Suffered Reverse From Austrians and Turks.

London.—The German cruiser Emden, whose sensational raids on British shipping and even on allied warships have been a constant source of humiliation to the British admiralty, is no more.

The news of the destruction of the Emden was announced by the admiralty at 7:30 p. m. The same time came word of another British victory on the sea when it was announced that the German protected cruiser Koensberg had been driven into the Ruffi river by the British cruiser Chatham.

The Emden's career has been the most picturesque in the German navy. Commanded by Capt. Karl von Muller she has swept the seas, capturing or sinking more than a score of merchant vessels of the allied nations.
