PROPOSED HIGH SCHOOL.

The School Board earnestly desires that the bonding proposition for the purchase of a High School site be passed at once. It will take until September 1918 to perfect plans, let the contract and build the building and until the site is selected it is impossible to make the plans as the shape of the building may have to vary to fit the location.

The increase of the school attendance is such that by Sept. 1916, the present quarters would be very inadequate and not only would the schools be seriously handicapped but the village would suffer in its growth.

The committee of 15 looked into this question and their unanimous vote was that a High School be built and the matter should proceed as fast as possible.

This committee in their thorough work in studying the needs for future building unanimously agreed on all points until the final ballot on the choice of sites, which resulted in nine ballots for the Brace site and five ballots for the Elmer site.

Therefore, with the consent of the Committee, the voters are asked to indicate their choice of sites at the time of voting on the bonds.
