**WHAT A GREAT AMERICAN PHYSICIAN SAYS ABOUT ALCOHOL.**  
One of America's most distinguished physicians is Dr. W. A. Evans, late chief health officer of Chicago. He says:  
"A man with the alcohol habit is a sick man, however much he may think to the contrary. He is mentally sick. He may have inherited a mental make-up which makes it strongly probable that he will be a drunkard, or it may be the fault of bad racial training. Usually, however, the disease develops as the result of what it feeds on. The man's mentality becomes perverted through chronic alcoholic poisoning."  
"Alcohol has a fuel value, but no food value. Its poisonous qualities overshadow its fuel value. It has no toxin neutralizing power. It is no longer used by well-informed people for snake bite, or consumption, or blood poisoning. Where it is a question of keeping a live cow for six or four hours, some crisis-dispense, its use may be justified, but to keep a patient upon it for days or perhaps weeks in typhoid or pneumonia, is unwise.
