ROSELAND PARK

Cemetery at the Twelve Mile Road is Progressing Rapidly, as is Also the Mausoleum.

Among the many busy places about this vicinity just at present is Roseland Park Cemetery which as spring approaches one notices from day to day the many improvements carried out which has been contemplated during the winter months. Many large and costly evergreens have been planted during the winter making a very marked improvement to the already beautiful landscape effects.

Many improvements are contemplated for the coming summer among which the plotting new sections. This is necessary on account of the very rapid sale of lots since last June. Many new monuments will be erected the coming season. Among others will be a handsome granite memorial on the George W. Wood lot, and one on the Gerow family plot of Birmingham.

Also the beautiful granite memorial to be erected on the American Eagle Lodge I. O. O. F. plot of Detroit, the base of which is five feet square and will be surmounted by a large bronze American Eagle, and will be one of the costliest in the cemetery and which is now being built by the Inch & Rambau Co.

There will also be erected a beautiful shaft on the Dr. Law family plot of Detroit.

The mausoleum which is fast nearing completion is a very busy place these days, 45 men, mostly from Birmingham being employed, besides 15 men who are erecting marble for the Vermont Marble Co. Supt. Wendorph extends to all a cordial invitation to visit the building while under construction so that all may see and know just how a modern mausoleum is constructed. You will be amply repaid for your trouble in the chair. It might be interesting to know how much material of different kinds has been used in its construction. The estimated grade will reach 4,000 yards of sand, 500 car loads of reinforcing steel were used, 35 car loads of Huron Portland cement, 5 car loads of marble and 8 tons of plaster of paris will be used in erecting the marble, 4 car loads of plaster will be consumed in the interior plaster work alone, while 2 car loads of material were used in the Terrace floor.

contemplated Being Given Here, by the Baptist Young People Next Fall and Winter.
