YOU SEEN A FLY?

Have You? Of Course You Killed Him! You Didn't! You Don't Kill Flies Until They bother you.

Well that is just the reason why there are so many flies around in the summer to make life miserable. Let me tell you a public secret.

Only a few flies live through the winter, and when they first come from their hiding places a Vigilance Committee of flies composed of every man, woman and child, could soon kill the majority of them. Old decaying material or refuse heaps of any kind furnish the chief breeding places of flies, the manure heap being the favorite of all. When we remember that each fly can produce hundreds of flies by September we can see how important such a Vigilance Committee must be in each community and what a service it can render to humanity. Not only is this true from the standpoint of freedom from annoyance, but from the standpoint of health as well, as authorities tell us that a large percent of sickness and death, especially among children, is due to the spread of disease germs through flies.

Will you take your share of the responsibility of exterminating this pest? Will you make it a principle to swat each fly you see and to enlist your neighbors as members of this Vigilance Committee?

A SUGGESTION FOR GOOD FRIDAY

At the last general convention of the Episcopal church a resolution was passed unanimously by the house of deputies. "Resolved, the house of bishops concurring, that we commend to all Christian people the observance of the ten minutes' thoughtful silence at three o'clock on Good Friday in recognition and commemoration of the sacrifice and death of the world's Saviour." The house of bishops adopted the following substitute: "Resolved, the house of deputies concurring, that we recognize with sympathy the inability of many Christian people to share in the age-long custom of setting apart Good Friday as a day of public and private devotion in commemoration of the sacrifice of our Lord. In view of this fact we call upon them at noon on that day to unite in at least a few minutes of special personal contemplation of Christ crucified. The address of deputies concurred in the substitute.

Possibly a word of explanation in regard to the motive and meaning of this action of the general convention may be acceptable to those of the clergy who are not present.

When a president of the United States dies during his term of office, at the time of his funeral there is a general cessation of business for a few moments throughout the country; the country is silent out of respect for his memory. When the president of a great railway system dies there is a cessation of business in his shops for a few minutes at the hour of his funeral; the system is silent out of respect for his memory. The veterans of the Grand Army observe a few minutes' silence at noon on Memorial Day in commemoration of the death of their comrades. It is the world's way of showing respect. There is no expression of recognition or commemoration of the sacrifice and death of the world's Saviour by the great Christian world. It ought to be Christmas in recognition of His birth; it very largely observes Easter in commemoration of His resurrection; the church has its Eucharist and its Good Friday services; but for multitudes of people who call themselves Christians, who believe in Christ, who honor His memory and trust in His atoning death, there is no expression of commensurate respect for the man who corresponds with that of His birth and resurrection. It is hoped that this may be changed and that they may feel its reasonableness and appropriateness; and that it may draw them to that larger expression of faith and love which the church affords; that if it is adopted and observed by our own church it may appeal to other Christian Communities, as our observance of Christmas and Good Friday has done. It indeed is a thing utterly inadequate, but anything would be inadequate, and something is better than nothing. The reverend Clergy are asked to commend it earnestly to their people, to their Clerical Unions, to the Ministers' Unions of their Christian bodies, to do what they may to "commend it to all Christian people."

Oakland County Boy's Conference.

The first annual Boy's conference of the city and County Young Men's Christian Association which was held at Pontiac, came to a close Sunday night.

The Conference was for the purpose of acquainting the County boys with the work of the Pontiac Y. M. C. A. is doing, of giving the city boys a glimpse of what is being accomplished for the youth of the county and to enable both city and county boys and their leaders to receive instructions as to how both movements can be carried forward to better advantage. The interest exhibited throughout the sessions was exceptional and the entire conference was considered a marked success.

The conference opened with a banquet at the Congregational Church which was scheduled for 6:30 o'clock, but long before that hour the boys began to gather in the basement and well before they went up for their own towns, their neighbors and individuals.

Rev. M. J. Sweet pronounced the invocation. The toastmaster, Francis J. H. McCotter of Rochester, Martin J. Whittaker, city secretary, A. B. Whittaker of the city association and several others.

Saturday morning a praise service was held at the Baptist church. J. A. VanDine conducted the service which was given over to short talks by the boys. Later in the morning B. B. Johnson gave an address "On the Hook."

Saturday afternoon was given over to recreation. An athletic contest was held at the Y M C A and several basketball games were played.

In the evening Mr. Johnson continued his address of the morning but Capt. Upton of Grand Rapids who was to have an address, did not come.

Sunday afternoon Mr. E. C. Foster of Detroit gave a splendid address to about 300 boys on the topic "It must be done."

The farewell service was held at the Congregational Church. Short talks expressing the benefits derived from the conference were given by the leaders from the towns of the county and boys of the city and county. To close the session and the conference the boys made a circle around the auditorium of the church enclosing the visitors and sang "Blest be the tie that binds."

About 20 Birmingham boys attended the conference, and a more detailed report will be given in the Mass meeting Sunday night.
