BIOGRAPHY.

George Wiley was born on April 1, 1879, in the village of Stratford, Ont. Through death in the household and the breaking up of the home he was adopted into another family whose name he bears. When about 19 years of age he crossed the border into the United States and came to Alpena, Mich., where he found employment with a blacksmith named James Hulp. In the family of this good Christian man the youth found not only a home but affection, and an interest in his life and character, and through its influence he was led to Christ, in whom he found salvation and the joy of a new life. He joined the Methodist Episcopal church in Alpena and has always continued in the fellowship of that denomination. After learning thoroughly the trade which he had set himself he turned a little time to farming, but later was back to the city and combined the trade of blacksmith with the business of selling agricultural implements.

On March 25, 1896, he was married to Miss Ada Brackinreed, who survives him, and to whom, Sept. 12, 1902, was born their little daughter Grace. Brother Wiley, with his family came to Birmingham in 1908, where he has been engaged in buying and selling residence property and in house building. To our church here he has brought his membership, and has grown in influence and usefulness as acquaintance with him and his family was made a trustee of the church and a year ago, in January, he was elected to the superintendency of the Sunday school, which has responded to the influence of his personality and energy and to his spiritual leadership.

This was a rare character—a combination of native force and energy and reserve that made him sought rather than a seeker for responsible and honorable position. His election to the office of village trustee was a recognition of sterling integrity, productive activity, and of popular regard. People who knew him loved him even as they trusted him. His immediate moral and spiritual influence as a Christian man was strong and unblemished by notable inconsistency or weakness. If it is to be said that he was a man of few words, the tenderness of his strong nature, evident in the Sunday school, was more apparent in his home, where his life well nigh ideal was there. A few hours before his tragic death the family about him had been uplifted together in family prayer. No one who has known Brother Wiley can think of the man who died without to any other cause than sudden but genuine and terrible insanity, a not unusual result of the dread disease from which he suffered.

No apology is needed for him. We are well assured that he who knoweth all our thoughts knows that no sudden temptation nor any meditated intention could act upon him, but that with no knowledge of what he did our brother's life went out. George Wiley was a man of God. We do not hesitate to say that we believe he is at this moment with the Lord and is with Him at His appearing.
