**CATTLE IN 50-FOOT DROP IN THE DARK**

Moving at Night, Come Upon a Blind Trail Ending in a Fatal Fall.

Lawton, Idaho—Precipitated from a high, 25 cattle were either killed outright or suffered broken backs, legs and ribs, near the Wenaha forest reserve, according to a story told here by Ray Foster, who returned from the ranch in Washington, adjoining the reserve. A two-week-old calf which went over the cliff was the most likely.

The animals were being taken to summer pasture by men living in the Altona district. After camp had been broken and others in the neighborhood to move, and those in charge of them

started to head them off. In the darkness they did not see that the animals were on a blind trail which led up to the edge of the cliff.

"When the cattle were bunched near the verge the drivers, not realizing the situation, began to crowd them and they fell over the cliff. The drivers went around to the head of the trail and turned them back.

The drivers appealed for help to myself and others in the neighborhood and with ladders we helped to draw the injured animals to a level spot, where the owners tried to attend to them. I advised them to shoot them, but they refused.

"The owners then tried the crudest kind of surgery that was not only useless but barbarously cruel."

**HORSES CATCH AND EAT FISH**

"Banker Ponies" Live on Sandy Coast of North Carolina and Forage for Living.

Baltimore, Md.—On the coast of North Carolina there are several miles of low, sandy shore where nothing grows except a coarse grass, a few salt water weeds and wild parsley. On these banks live a strange breed of half-wild horse, known as "banker ponies." These creatures are generally about twice the size of Shetland ponies. Every year the best owners drive the "bankers" into pens, brand the foals with the proper mark and catch some of the older animals to sell to the dealer.

North Carolinians say the beasts must be starved into eating grain, hay or grass, for they have always shined up the rank marsh grass in the marshes and on fish. They catch the fish themselves at low tide; with their hoofs they dig deep holes into the sand below the water mark and when the tide falls they greedily devour the fish that are stranded in these holes. Often they fight briskly over an especially tempting morsel.

In captivity these strange horses are intelligent, but seldom are even temper. One noted, they make excellent draft animals, for they have a strength disproportionate to their size. Foals bred from "bankers" in captivity make valuable animals—strong and intelligent.

Unsociated Rodent Bites Live Wire and Forces Miles of Traffic Stops.

Beloit, Wis.—This is a tale—a sad tale, but a true one, of a squirrel and unsophisticated; the tale of the squirrel, his sharp teeth and a live wire.
