



Milk is one of the most perishable of foods. It will not remain in good condition more than a few hours, when produced and handled carelessly. It quickly ferments or sours and may undergo other changes. The may undergo other changes. The commonly called germs, some of which may cause disease. The chief source of bacteria in milk is the foreign matter which finds its way into milk, such as small particles of soil or mawure, hairs, dust, old milk, impure water, etc., all of which are carriers of bacteria.

The watchwords of the careful dairyman should always be cleanli-diryman should always be cleanli-

riers of bacteria. The waterwords of the careful dairyman should always be cleanliness and low temperatures, but more especially so during the warm season. Since it is impossible to exclude all bacteria from milk, the producer should aim to exclude a many as possible and then to check the growing the clean by the control of the first may be done by meeting cleanliness. The cows should be kept clean by brushing and by whoing off the flanks and udders. This does not require much time and is necessary where the cows have access to marshes and dirty barnyards.
