#### E. Donald Roberts, Jr. a Former Birmingham Lad is Fighting Mexicans. Sees Service.

Interesting incidents connected with the taking of Vera Cruz and many stories of the treachery of the Mexicans are told in letters which have come from the front from E. Donald Roberts, Jr., son of E. Donald Roberts, photographer in the Brossy building, Woodward and Warren avenues. Roberts is a gun-painter among the marines aboard the battleship New Jersey.

The Mexicans are extremely treacherous, writes young Roberts. "They threw a red cross flag over one of the hospitals, then got in the windows and shot at us knowing that we would not fire on a building under the red cross flag. A funeral party with six pall-bearers and mourners was held up. When we opened the casket we found it full of new rifles and ammunition. A red cross party bearing a stretcher was also held up. Under the covering on the stretcher, we found a live soldier with a loaded rifle and plenty of ammunition. He admitted that whenever opportunity offered he sat upright and fired at the Americans. We executed nine Mexicans for firing at our red cross stations. We intended to make our headquarters at the big infantry barracks in the heart of the city. Then we found the walls and floors mined with dynamite which could be touched off from outside by means of an electric current.

"We are encamped on the ground floor of the railroad station at Vera Cruz," he writes. "The enemy is but four and a half miles away. They could take the water works night before last, but were repulsed by 250 marines. The Mexicans keep on shooting at us from behind windows and curtains and it would take a look to tell the outrages they commit.

"Vera Cruz is a stunningly fine place, and its women are more beautiful than their city. They make up the general ugliness of the men. Money is so cheap here you can get three Mexican dollars for one American dollar."

All that portion of the town lying south of Maple and west of Woodward Avenue from 5 to 7 p. m.

We do not want the people to infer from this that there is a scarcity of water at the wells, but where the whole town is using water for sprinkling purposes at the same time, should a fire occur, it is simply impossible to get any pressure. DO NOT WASTE WATER, and should the fire whistle blow while you are sprinkling, SHUT OFF THE WATER.
