THE playmates of Neptune swarm the beaches in costumes and bathing caps almost as varied as the faces of their wearers.

The introduction of rubber fabric in all sorts of colors and patterns there is a choice of solid colors or gay stripes or of attractive plaids.

The suit shown in the picture may be made in either of these fabrics and trimmed with cotton or light wool broad (tweed) before it is applied.

Like all the garments now fashionable it is cut on simple lines. The waist and skirt are joined under a broad belt, and the dress fastens with snap fastenings like those on a glove.

This one-piece suit is worn over bloomers that reach barely to the knee. It is all right for the miss, or for anyone else, to dispense with stockings and sandals, but few people care to avail themselves of this privilege.

The feet are more comfortable in light sandals. And stockings make quite an important element in the good effect of the suit. It is an item of style, this dressing of the feet properly.

The cap, as the picture shows, is quite an elaborate bit of headwear, quite different from the simple puffed cap of rubber cloth which preceded it.

But this pretty bit of headwear really is hardy practical for the girl that really swims. And she who gives that for the bathing suit, perhaps because it is a novelty which is not thoroughly introduced.
