BALDWIN PARK.

Supervision of Village Playground Badly Needed. Big Bad Boys Become a Nuisance.

Supervision of Baldwin park is greatly needed. This pleasant spot, fitted with swings and seats, is the play spot of many children.

Experts in child-life have found that youths require as careful training in the use of playgrounds as in the learning of any trade.

For this reason, all city playgrounds are under the management of trained workers who supervise games and prohibit lawlessness and the formation of "gangs", composed of children whose one idea is to destroy property and have what is considered by them a "good time".

A mother recently took her small child to Baldwin park and returned within an hour, disgusted with the antics and spirit of the place. She said: "It is a shame for Birmingham to have such a beautiful spot where children are allowed to act as they please without any supervision whatever."

"There are children in Baldwin park of all ages. Some delight in trying their best to destroy the swings, pull branches from trees and throw mud and stones in the fountain. Not only is this true but I found the small girls minus an article of clothing, disappearing in the swings. This was too much for me. I could not consent to have my child witness such wanton sights."

Last summer the ladies of the village attempted supervision and volunteers were present afterwards. This is the statement of one of the ladies who spent an afternoon at Baldwin park: "I stood it as long as I could. I finally 'cleaned up' on the big boys, took the young girls home and went home myself, thoroughly disgusted."

This supervision can never be accomplished by young women or even adult women. In Baldwin park we need a man whose authority is unquestioned and whose word will be law. Would it not be wise for the village council to appoint a man as supervisor of our park? Certainly the small outlay of money would be well worth while in the furtherance of morality among the youths who frequent Baldwin park.

WOMEN AT SCHOOL MEETINGS

Drinking Fountain For Man and Beast, Erected to His Memory By Mrs. Hiram Still.

From the Signa's, (Mich.) Gazette we clip the following, which is of interest to many of our readers who are known to Captain and Mrs. Hiram Still, who lived in town Line a few years ago at Saug Harbor, and later on rechristened The Maple.

Announcement was made yesterday that the drinking fountain for man and beast at the southwest corner of Court and Washington at the entrance to Rust park is the gift of Mrs. Hiram Still, in memory of her husband, who was a prominent Saginaw resident for many years.

He was among the leaders in the early lumbering business, and was one of the best known men in the county. The fountain will be dedicated with appropriate ceremony at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning by H. W. S. Linton, assisted by Saginaw Post, No. 38, G. A. R. and the other organizations of the city.

The inscription on the fountain which will be unveiled and formally presented to the city reads as follows: "To the Memory of Hiram Still, who by his wife, Charlotte Burton, Dedicated this fountain to the city of Saginaw, Walter Harris on Carlisle street."

Recalls Lumbering Days. The fountain, constructed of Barre, Vermont, granite at a cost of about \$1,200. It has a trough for exercising the right when she has a chance, what is the use?
